the country to examine the role that data and technology have historically played in Black communities and to chart out a bold blueprint for the future.

## Highlights from Last Year

- Expanded our network of scientists and activists
- Hosted regional gatherings in New York, Boston, and Washington, D.C.
- Provided support and resources to local efforts to end the use of discriminatory riskscoring (Ramsey County, MN), to collect data on education outcomes for Black and brown

- students (Cambridge, MA), and to fight back against racist public school enrollment algorithms (New York, NY)
- Co-hosted a briefing on Capitol Hill for members of congress and staff on the risks associated with algorithmic decision-making
- Published an Open Letter to Facebook on behalf of the Data for Black Lives movement. Our demands were later endorsed by Senator Cory Booker.

### 2017 Conference Snapshot



#### **Over 400 participants**

- 70% participants of color
- 50% Black
- **75** students
- 150 participants provided discounted rates and/or travel support
- 150 activists and organizers working on issues ranging from housing to public health to education justice.
- 100 data scientists and software engineers

#### Over 40 presenters, with:

- 80% panelists of color
- 70% Black
- 60% women
