LEAH BEEFERMAN | NEW EDITIONS 2018

Brooklyn-based artist Leah Beeferman has spent the better part of the last decade traveling in remote areas characterized by their distinctive landscapes and geological features: the rocky coastlines of Norway, the volcanic terrain of Iceland, the icy fjords of the Arctic territory of Svalbard, and the dense forests of Finland. The sights and sounds of these locales form the basis of videos, sound pieces, and digital prints where the physical and virtual realms collide. Collaging her personal lexicon of digitally-generated marks over and under fragmented images of waves, rocks, sand, and snow, Beeferman stages visual contestations between observation and abstraction, reality and virtuality.

Following an open call for project proposals, Beeferman was selected as the inaugural recipient of the Island Press Emerging Artist Fellowship. This biennial program was established in 2016 to recognize artists in the early stages of their career who exhibit exceptional potential. During her weeklong residency, Beeferman migrated her pursuit of immateriality from the digital arena to the print workshop, a space inherently distinguished by the physicality of its substances, tools, and processes. Force 2 (Flow) is a multilayered work combining collagraph inkjet printing, and chine collé. The print is anchored by a video still that captures the explosive force with which lava spewed from the fissures of the Icelandic lava field of Holuhraun during a 2014 eruption. Beeferman first became enthralled with the Holuhraun eruption when she watched the event unfold in real time via live video stream. Now color-shifted to yellow and rendered in printer's ink, the lava has entered a new

phase of matter. The new tonality lends the eruption a hallucinatory quality, which is heightened by the amorphous forms that seem to hover over the lava, like floaters passing through our field of vision.

The *Force* series also adds a new dimension to Beeferman's ongoing engagement with quantum mechanics, specifically with the concept that ostensibly empty spaces are dense with matter that is imperceptible to the human eye. *Force 1 (Float)* offers a space of infinite depth and highly charged activity. It envelopes us in a field of richly pigmented blue ink, which was mixed locally in St. Louis to replicate the blue used prominently in her digital videos and prints. Beeferman first experimented with translating this hue to the graphic realm in the book Triple





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Point, which used the relationship between lava and solid rock to explore questions of conversion in art and physics. In the Island Press edition, enigmatic shapes of pure, saturated color—both printed and collaged—are suspended just above the paper surface, while hazier bodies recede below, gesturing toward the movement and materiality subatomic particles. Like much of her work, the Force prints simultaneously conjure observable, natural phenomena and the unseen, intangible forces that propel them.

Leah Beeferman is an artist from New York City, currently based in Helsinki. She has had solo exhibitions at Rawson Projects, NY and Sorbus, Helsinki. Recent two-person and group exhibitions include Klaus von Nichtssagend, NY; Bass & Reiner, San Francisco; Fridman Gallery, NY; Ditch Projects, OR; Interstate Projects, Brooklyn; Tyson, Cologne; and Toves, Copenhagen.
