President's Report



The 2014 year has been a period of constant challenges and numerous changes. I will attempt to outline key issues of importance.

Board. The number of the Board has increased to seven (7) with the addition of two appointed Directors, Michelle Martin and Craig Meagher. With the additional Board members and therefore a far greater spread of skills, experience and available time it is firmly believed that the management for squash in Australia will improve significantly.

Constitution. Attempts to replace the Memorandum and Articles of Association with a new model Constitution have as yet not been successful but by continuing to work on this with the members it is expected that consensus should be able to be reached in the near future.

High Performance Review. For some years, due to declining results at the elite level, it has been recognised that Australia needed to evaluate its goals, strategies and planning in the High Performance area. Now under the direction of Ken Watson and his committee we are well under way with a very comprehensive and widely consultative review that will recommend the necessary changes that are required to restore Australian to the levels of performance at the elite level that we have come to expect.

Australian Open/Closed Championships. The Australian Closed was conducted at Mulgrave Country Club in December 2014 by Squash & Racquetball Victoria with financial assistance approved by the Squash Australia board. For 2015, 2016 and 2017 Squash & Racquetball Victoria will conduct the Australian Open at MSAC. A special thanks to Victoria for putting their hands up to do this very important World class event.

CEO Review. In an endeavour to improve on our management and governance, an independent consultant was contracted to undertake a comprehensive review of the CEO and his role in our organisation. Members, Associates, staff and Board members have all been consulted in this review which is designed to ensure that all parties are aware of the required duties and responsibilities of the CEO and seek their input into how this position should be and is being carried out. This is an exercise to benefit the CEO and stakeholders and the CEO has been fully informed of the reasons, process and progress of the review.

PSCAA Dispute. For some four years there has been an ongoing dispute between Squash Australia and the PSCAA. This is not in the interests of squash and many

members of each organisation are frustrated that the dispute has continued without a clear resolution. The Board has appointed a Committee with two representatives of each of the Board and the PSCAA to evaluate the matters in dispute and make a recommendation to the Board on the best method to bring the matter to an end so that squash coaches and Squash Australia can work closely together for the advancement of squash in this country.

Finance. ASC funding has been reduced by \$320,000 for 2015 onwards (although there was a transitional additional grant of \$100,000 for 2015). This will present some very significant challenges to our financial ability to manage the organisation and put in place the necessary High Performance programmes. In view of this the financial reporting system has been reviewed so that information provided for Board and Management is simpler, more effective and more easily updated in comparison of budgets to actual, and should also lead to reductions in operational costs. Budgets are now prepared on a three year basis compared to one year as in the past. An Audit, Finance and Risk Committee has been formed from Board members to focus on the financial issues and work with the CEO to ensure financial reporting is more effective and timely.

Commonwealth Games 2014. The selection of our athletes followed by various appeals was unfortunate. Whilst I do not want to go into detail on the issues involved (it would take far too much time and everyone could have a differing opinion). The Board is determined to take the necessary actions to minimise the chances of this type of dispute arising in the future. The High Performance Review includes a review of all related regulations with recommendations for changes where required. However despite the turbulent start the final results of two (2) Gold Medals and one (1) Bronze medal gave Australia the number one ranking for squash. A special thanks to David Palmer (2 Gold) Rachael Grinham (1 Gold 1 Bronze) Cameron Pilley (1 gold) Kasey Brown (1 Bronze). Remember that in 2018 we have the next Commonwealth Games on the Gold Coast.

Participation and Registrations. The Board is fully aware that the future and prosperity of squash in Australia is almost totally dependent on increasing participation and ensuring wherever possible that all active squash players are recorded on a registration system so that not only are our numbers increasing but that we have evidence of this fact for government funding and sponsorship opportunities. The Interact system as presented to the 2014 AGM needs to be fully promoted and utilised at every level of the squash fraternity (State, Club, Centre operators) to obtain, retain, inform and enthuse existing registered players and register all other active players. Strategies must be developed in

consultation with stakeholders that will be and can be effective in achieving our registration goals.

World Masters in Hong Kong. I believe this is an opportunity to promote the world class achievements of our master's players who were successful in winning a total of 17 medals of which 7 were gold at the 2014 World Masters Championship.

I am pleased to advise that Peter Wright, the President of Australian Masters Squash, has been officially recognised in the Australia Day Honours List. Peter has received an OAM "for service to the sport of squash through a range of executive roles". Congratulations Peter Wright OAM.

Chief Executive Officer Report



As a Commonwealth Games sport the concluding year in the quadrennial Games cycle brings with it great anticipation, not surprisingly the general population want the Green and Gold to 'do well', to win medals to hear the AUSSIE, AUSSIE, AUSSIE OI OI OI ring out loud and often. For those closer to a sport probably like most of the readers of this report they also want the sport to 'go well'.

It's a matter of history now and as the cover of the Annual Report shows, the medal tally was favourable for Australia, with two Gold and a Bronze medal to be the leading Squash nation on the gold medal tally and second behind England in overall medals. The charge was led by David Palmer who won gold with Rachael Grinham in the mixed doubles and then partnered with Cameron Pilley to win the Men's, Cameron was not to be outdone winning a second medal, a bronze when he teamed with Kasey Brown in the mixed.

We congratulate all of the Squash team; players, staff and the wider Australian squad on a great Games!

Squash is a 'section' of the wider Australian Commonwealth Games Team and we acknowledge and thank the Australian Commonwealth Games Association for their tremendous support in preparing for and then faultlessly facilitating the arrangements to have the Australian team attend the Glasgow Games.

The take out from the 2014 Games will be doubles squash. Often regarded the distant cousin or perhaps the forgotten relative, however with rules progression over recent years, the doubles matches in Glasgow has put the discipline into sharper focus at not only a performance level but also as a potential opportunity to grow participation as another offering for clubs and centres in their weekly programming.

I believe the board is working hard and is focused on the necessary changes that are required to improve governance and management and is acting in a positive forward thinking manner that will result in significant advancement for squash in Australia in the coming years.

The amount of work contributed by Board members and the CEO over the past year has been substantial and I take this opportunity to express my personal thanks to each of them for their generous contribution in a difficult and stressful year which has been full of changes that were necessary to put squash on track to a much more successful future.

While quite rightly I have opened my report with the Commonwealth Games, for the organisation it was a year full of activity, of successes and of at times challenge.

I will in my report highlight a number of areas of Squash Australia's work, our partners and the Board's activity but would encourage you to read on to reports which detail the breadth of programming and activity undertaken by members, volunteers and staff in participation, championships, workforce and media.

Behind the scenes work for a sporting organisation is extensive, with a wide range of responsibilities to be covered from regulatory aspects including corporation law, community (e.g. child protection), ethics (e.g. anti-doping) to expectations of the sport's members and participants including education programs, communication, calendar development, membership and participation in international affairs. I extend my thanks and acknowledge the contribution of many fantastic volunteers across a range of committees, tournaments and participation programs that support the sport and delivered these outcomes while to fellow Squash Australia staff I acknowledge your dedicated work.

Australian Sports Commission/ Australian Institute of Sport

Squash Australia has utilised its Federal Government grant funds in the programs which are focused on the international success 'Aussies' pine for, while providing support for the next generation of youngsters to take on the world and laying a course for the future by building participation at the grass roots level.

The framework within which the Federal Government will provide funds to Squash Australia for high performance is 'Australia's Winning Edge' with the Australian Institute of Sport facilitating the investment of funds to sports which can meet the objectives of the Government. The objective which Squash falls within is for Australia to be the leading nation at the Commonwealth Games and so

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as a result Squash is eligible for funds from Australia's Winning Edge.

In the same way which the Federal Government restructured its High Performance processes with the 'Australia's Winning Edge' was the announcement in 2014 that the focus in the Participation area would be the creation of a new program to commence in 2015 titled 'Sporting Schools' to be delivered by a select group of sports. Fortunately through the development of the Oz Squash program in conjunction with the revamp of the Coaches Recognition Framework, Squash has been allocated a position as one of the 34 sports to be funded for delivery into schools. While a new opportunity, the closure of the Active After Schools Program (AASC) in December 2014 will be a disappointment for many.

The revamped programs and their related funding is no gift, the requirements for Squash Australia are elevated, not only is on court performance a key measure, but off court as well. The servicing and promoting of ASC/AIS support, the organisation's capacity to fund or support its operation beyond grant income and the way the sport governs itself by comparison with the Australian Sport Commission's Governance Guidelines and Requirements are all taken into account in the Annual Sports Performance Review process.

Although outside the reporting period, in February 2015, Squash Australia's recognition as the National Sports Organisation for Squash through to June 2018 was confirmed by the Australian Sports Commission. The recognition provides benefits such as access to grants and conditional eligibility for the use of the Commonwealth Coat of Arms while obligating the organisation in areas such as reporting, DEFAT directions, Anti-Doping, Match Fixing etc.

The ongoing support of the Australian Government through the Australian Sports Commission and the Australian Institute of Sport is greatly appreciated by the organisation.

Squash in Australia

Since its endorsement by the members *Squash in Australia* has challenged the national body to expand in a strategic context beyond areas such as the conduct of Australian Championships and presenting Australian Teams to also playing a role in Participation, Development and Facilities.

The strategic context for 2014 was presented in the Squash in Australia Forward Plan as published on the organisation's website.

Key Projects /Organisational Shifts

On line Registration System development

A key focus for the organisation is the ongoing development of IT resources to enable the effective oversight and promotion of the game. A system that will

support Clubs, Centres, State & Territory Associations in promotion administration that will integrate with Squash Matrix was put to tender and by year end *Play Squash* was nearing completion for utilisation in 2015.

Multi Age Group National Talent Squads & Match Play

The restructure of the junior pathway so as to allow additional opportunities for younger players to gain international experience was brought into operation for under 13, 15, 17 & 19 girls and boys. With events held in Australia (Trans-Tasman v NZ) and tours to Malaysia (twice) and Singapore. Some 31 young Australian players gained international match play experience with a significant training block at each event. A key aspect to the program was the appointment of underpinning program coaches from Queensland, Victoria, NSW and Western Australia who attended the tours.

Coach Development Framework

The new Coach Development Framework for the recognition and accreditation of coaches was brought into operation in 2014. Two training programs were held so as to allow member State & Territory Associations to have their nominated staff gain familiarisation and training to deliver recognition within their state & territories. By year's end over 30% of squash coaches have been recognised under the new framework.

Focus on Social Media

Over 2014 the organisation took opportunities to expand its use of Facebook and Twitter. As a result a steady incremental increase in those utilising the service has taken place. For Facebook 'likes' increased from 458 to 880 while for Twitter 'followers' increased from 314 to 474.

An Australian Championship

With the Australian Open not being offered in 2013 or 2014, an Australian Closed Championships was offered in Melbourne at the Mulgrave Country Club December 2014 so as to give Australian players the opportunity to vie for their National title.

Constitutional Review

A key outcome of the 2013 Governance Review was to see the Members resolve a new Constitution for the proper conduct of the organisation. Drafts were put to the Members at two General Meetings in 2014 and were unsuccessful.

Challenges / Threats

Places to Play

A constant and significant challenge for the sport remains the places to play the sport.

Financial Footing of Squash Australia and the State & Territory Associations

The Australian Sports Commission identifies that Squash Australia has an over reliance on grants, while four of the State & Territory Associations ran at a deficit in their last

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financial period. Both individually and collectively these aspects are of concern.

Board and Director Activity

The Squash Australia Board met on sixteen occasions through 2014, with ten teleconferences and six 'face to face' meetings, those being in Sydney, Brisbane, Melbourne, Adelaide, Perth and Melbourne.

Directors attend to representational requirements in accord with their role, the record of attendance is provided in the table below. Additionally, Directors have also attended meetings with service providers, Member Associations and Squash Australia advisory committees.

It has been another significant year for the Australian Sports Commission and the sports network as we continue to work together to pursue victory on the world stage and inspire all Australians to experience the joy of sport.

Despite a challenging economic environment, in 2013–14 the Australian Government invested almost \$120 million in our national sporting organisations. In high performance, Australia's Winning Edge continues to evolve as we target sports with potential to deliver international success and invest more in our most promising athletes.

Some highlights in 2013–14 have included:

- Campaign Rio — a partnership between the AIS, Australian Olympic Committee and Australian Paralympic Committee to prepare athletes for the Rio Olympic Games.

Our work with sports to reform governance structures and develop their strategic and commercial capabilities also continues. The ASC is determined to create better businesses and we are leading the way with a lean and agile operating model, a new AIS brand, and continued focus on philanthropy through the Australian Sports Foundation.

Grassroots participation remains a key priority, with the Australian Government's announcement of the Sporting Schools program a significant endorsement of community sport. The \$100 million program will commence in 2015 — reaching more than 850,000 children — and will enable sports to boost their participation numbers.

National Development Manager Report



Squash Australia has continued to ensure Australians are exposed to the sport through a range of participation initiatives. The key project areas of OzSquash, the Coach Development Framework and the Australian Junior Squash Tour (AJST) have enabled

Squash to once again be recognized by the Australian Sports Commission (ASC) as a Priority Sport in the Participation Sector of Australian Sport.

Changes in the ASC and the Active After School Care (AASC) have provided challenges and necessary adjustments to plan, processes and administration of participation within the sport throughout the year. However, the outcome has remained the same — “to increase participation”.

In 2014 the AASC program influenced the business and capacity of squash in Australia. The AASC invested over \$48,000 through program delivery grants enabling over 3,800 primary school-aged children experience squash in the AASC environment.

The statistical information that follows has been generated from AASC program data and will be useful in identifying where your sport had its greatest exposure and highest levels of participation in 2014.

This information also provides an indication of the existing coach workforce that has been delivering squash through the AASC program. This information will now be useful for Squash Australia in consideration of potential delivery reach through the new Sporting Schools Program (SSP) in 2015 planned for release in mid-2015 and beyond, replacing the AASC program. Squash Australia will continue to evolve in this SSP initiative along with the centres/clubs environment stage of the OzSquash Program.

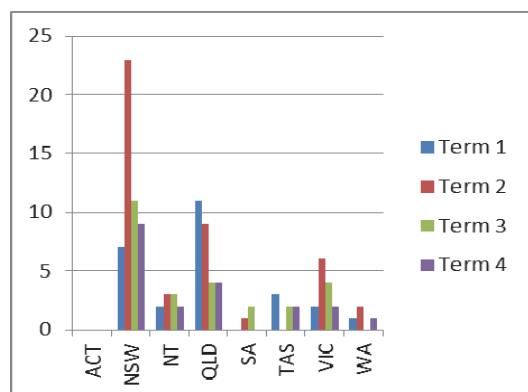

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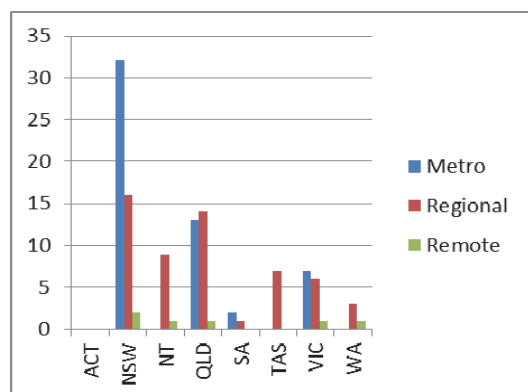

The graph below depicts the number of squash programs delivered in metro, regional and remote areas during 2014, broken down by jurisdiction.



The total number reflects 80% growth on the previous reporting period. Participant results exceed the performance of the total program data, also providing a clear reflection of the continued impact the AASC in delivery of OzSquash has on the actual volume of participants with a continued increase of approximately 1,700 extra children exposed to the sport in 2014.

The AJST continued to be successful in 2014, with some 80 tournaments being recognized, highlighting the abilities for States and Territories to work together in the administration of the sport. These benefits of the Australian Junior Squash Tour (AJST) continue to:

- Participation—Increasing recognition of participation through sanctioned tournaments
- Establishment of determinable and measurable KPIs against the sports' strategic plan
- Recognition of athletes – Australian Junior Squash Tour Ranking (AR) System
- Sponsorship opportunities
- Facility Operators engagement
- Cohesive approach demonstrated amongst all States & Territories, supported by Squash Australia.
- Basically it provides 'OPPORTUNITY'

The following data represents the levels of participation amongst the States and Territories for the AJST, as reported to the ASC in 2014. Data collection may not be a true representation of the changes, as processes have been adjusted to meet ASC reporting needs.

National Refereeing Manager Report



Refereeing commitments in 2014 remained significant, despite the absence of the Australian and ACT Opens, with referees provided to National events and the Australian Squash Tour, including the State Opens. Australian Refereeing programs continue to meet world's

best practice, at least matching and, in most Regions, exceeding achievement elsewhere.

The State and Territory support to refereeing was good. Almost all refereeing costs for State Opens were funded, including bringing in referees from elsewhere where local numbers were short. Some States also took the longer term view, and used visiting referees to run player and referee training courses. More is needed to achieve refereeing self-sufficiency in all states and National Refereeing will continue to support these programs.

Tournaments were well used by referees to maintain or upgrade their accreditation levels. Twenty-one National, AST and AJST events were covered with 21 Australian referees and one New Zealander provided with 81 assignments. Referees were mainly National level or above with opportunities also found for State referees with potential for advancement to National level.

National Referee numbers increased by one to 10. Regional numbers reduced by two to 3.

Our contribution to WSF Refereeing continued to be significant in 2014. Our WSF referees Chris Sinclair, Damien Green, Nathan Turnbull and newly appointed Russell Weatherburn all had WSF overseas appointments during the year. These included all four going to the Commonwealth Games in Glasgow where the more notable assignments included Centre Referee appointments for Damien in the Men's Singles Gold Medal match, Nathan in the Men's Singles Bronze Medal match and Russell in the Women's Doubles Gold Medal match. Other significant WSF appointments included the Men's World Championship,

World Men's and Women's Team Championships and Junior Men's Individual and Team Championships.

Chris Sinclair is not continuing as a WSF Referee from the end of 2014. Her twenty-seven years of service to WSF were recognised with a presentation made to her by WSF Vice-President Linda MacPhail during the Women's World Team Championships in Canada.

Chris remains on the WSF Referees' and Rules Committee and is a WSF Senior Assessor. Chris and Damien are WSF Assessors and part of the WSF Referee Appointments process. Chris and John Small continue to provide advice on the ongoing development of WSF Refereeing, including CBTA standards for assessors and referees at all levels. For the Oceania Federation, Chris Sinclair continues as Refereeing Convenor and John Small is on the Refereeing Committee. Both continue to develop better standards for Oceania referees at all levels.

New Singles Rules came into effect on 1st January 2014, and new Doubles Rules will be in effect from 1st January 2015. A workshop for all National and above referees and State Refereeing representatives was held in Melbourne in February to apprise all of the Singles changes. Many presentations have been given subsequently around Australia for players and lower-level referees.

Refereeing priorities for 2015 are expected to include: assistance for WSF, Regional and National referees and assessors; assistance for State referees to achieve National accreditation; further dissemination of the Rules; initial preparations for Gold Coast 2018; and encouraging and supporting State associations to improve their local refereeing.

I wish to thank Chris Sinclair and Damien Green for their work on the Rules & Refereeing Committee, and all those who committed voluntary time during the year. Support has again been provided from the top by Presidents John Lee and Steve Bowen, and CEO Gary O'Donnell, while Finance & Administration Officer Ryan Wiegand has continued his good work.

Media Liaison Officer Report



12 months ago I lamented the fact we had no 'big ticket' event to help raise the profile of squash.

In 2014 we had the big ticket event – the Glasgow Commonwealth Games – and we grasped it with both hands, winning gold medals and gaining valuable media exposure.

Unfortunately much of that good work was overshadowed by personality clashes and selection issues, but while it made for uncomfortable reading at the time, the long-term damage to the image of squash was negligible.

We greatly increased our social media coverage in 2014, adding a YouTube channel to our Facebook and Twitter accounts. Our challenge in 2015 is to increase the traffic to these sites.

One of the most positive steps we have taken in this direction is enlisting top Australian player, Lisa Camilleri, to help with aspects of our social media coverage.

Outside the Commonwealth Games, the most successful event from the perspective of media coverage was the women's teams' event in Canada.

We attracted newspaper and online coverage of the results, and generated some excellent social media on our own sites.

In 2015 we have more great events to hopefully excite the media, including the return of the Australian Open. Hopefully these events will attract not only the best of our own players, but also some big name players from overseas.

But the elephant in the Australian squash room at the moment is the lack of our own successful big name player.

After decades of dominating the sport Internationally, Australia does not have either a male or female world top ten player. As we know, the media and sponsors love a hero, and love a world beater.

The long-term signs are encouraging, with a handful of talented juniors starting to make their mark. There are many excellent opportunities in 2015 for these juniors to further their International experience, which bodes well for the future of squash in Australia.

The challenge is to fill the void in the meantime.

Junior Talent Development Report



2014 was a very exciting year for Squash Australia with regard to junior international events.

We focused on giving opportunities to our elite, junior players from U13 through to U19 on the international arena to assist in their ongoing development and preparation for the future. This also enabled opportunities for coaches within the Pathway to gain experience.

These events highlighted areas and age groups which require further development before venturing into this international arena again. On the flip side, a few players shone with this opportunity which is only going to enhance the future of squash in this country and prepare players for future World Team Championships and beyond.

The 2014 International Tours included:

- * Trans-Tasman Test Match v Australia and Oceania Junior Open
- * Malaysia Test Match and Malaysian Junior Open
- * Asian Tour - Malaysia and Singapore Test Matches / Kuala Lumpur and Singapore Junior Opens

1. Trans-Tasman Test Match and Oceania Junior Open

These events were held at the Palm Beach on the Gold Coast. The Australian Development Team consisted of 19 players to play against New Zealand in a 2 day Test Match Series. Australia won the Trans-Tasman Cup in a thrilling, well-received battle - 19 matches to 18.

The players went on to compete in the Oceania Junior Open in which Ethan Eyles, Lakeesha Rarere, Jess Turnbull and Sam Ejtemai won their respective age groups.

2. Malaysia Test Match and Malaysian Junior Open

May saw another Australian Development Team travel to Penang to compete against Malaysia in a test match in which Malaysia won convincingly. The Team went on to compete in the Malaysian Junior Open. This was certainly a much tougher trip which showed the players and coaches at what standard they need to be striving for. However, a lot of players gained great experience from this Tour.

3. Asian Tour

The final Tour for 2014 was a longer trip encompassing a Malaysia Test Match, Kuala Lumpur Junior Open, Singapore Test Match and Singapore Junior Open. The

Development Team included predominantly potential World Junior Open players. It is an opportunity for them to develop team spirit and camaraderie plus gain some much needed international experience.

Again, Malaysia has proven it is a country that is producing a high level of juniors. Incredibly tough matches were on offer throughout this time with the players also having the opportunity to train at the Malaysian Squash Academy. Alex Eustace produced the best result on this sector by finishing in 2nd place in the Kuala Lumpur Junior Open. There were other top 10 finishes from team mates.

The Development Team then arrived in Singapore. Alex Eustace won the U17 Boys and Lakeesha Rarere won the U19 Girls in the Singapore Junior Open. There was, once again, some top 10 finishes from the team.

Overall, this was a successful tour. Malaysia is definitely a region we will continue to focus relations with as the Australian juniors will only continue to benefit from the experience.

It should be mentioned that Ethan Eyles competed in the Canadian Junior Open in December finishing in 2nd place before heading to Yale to again compete in the US Junior Open which is the largest Junior Tournament in the world with over 1000 participants. Ethan finished in 3rd place.

The introduction in December of a U21/23 test match against Malaysia in Victoria was also a great success. It was held prior to the Australian Closed. The Australian Team included Matt Hopkin, Rhys Dowling and Tom Calvert. Tyler Hawkins stepped in for Rhys at the last minute. These opportunities have arisen due to the growing relationship with Malaysia and I believe it is important to also focus on the players transitioning from juniors into seniors.

Overall, the opportunities offered throughout 2014 enabled positive feedback and guidance for future tours. There are definitely a group of juniors that will continue to thrive off these tournaments and I look forward to Squash Australia continuing to develop these potential stars for our sport as well as assisting the transition from juniors to seniors. A special thank you for the support of the Underpinning Programs and Coaches I have had the opportunity to work with throughout the year.

World Squash Federation Conference and AGM Report

I was honoured to be allowed to represent Australia at the WSF AGM and associated Conferences. Firstly I wish to state that I believe attendance at the AGM and workshops was very important and productive

AGM. Successful nominees to the board were the two male incumbents (Mohammed El-Menshawy and Hugo Hannes) plus Linda McPhail.

Olympics. The President repeatedly gave his strong belief that the International Committee was looking very favourably upon the introduction of squash as an Olympic sport in 2020. From his discussions with various IOC Committee members it appears that there will be a significant change in the manner of sports selection.

- Athletes numbers capped at 10,000 as before
- An additional 2 to 4 sports included
- Reduction of events for some existing sports

Squash was seen as an ideal additional sport in that only some 64 athletes would be needed to bring a new sport into the Olympics.

US Squash. In 2005 US Squash was in a state of inaction, with low standards of administration and with limited financial resources. In 2005 a comprehensive business review was undertaken, long term strategies established and quality board members head hunted and the changes and results to squash in America have been extraordinary.

- Registrations increased by 149%
- Participation numbers increased by 126% to 1.3million
- Junior numbers increased 400%
- Tournaments with up to 1000 entries
- Staff numbers increased from 4 to 24.

The past President's (Geanne Blasberg and Peter Lasusa) and current CEO are more than willing to provide us with detailed summaries of the processes undertaken and plans established.

US Open. Prize money in 2014 was approximately USD300, 000. The Goal outlined by the CEO of US Squash at the celebratory dinner following the 2014 US Open was that in line with the planning instituted in 2013 the prize money in 9 years would be USD 1000,000.

Prize money equality amongst male and females was established in recent years and will continue.

PSA and WSA. A joint address was made to the workshop on a merger proposed to take effect from 1st January 2015. This has now taken place with a successful merger of the two organisations.

Squash Canada. They have established an online referee development programme involving components as follows

- Introduction and reasons for undertaking the course
 - Explanation by module of the rules with 3 questions at the end of each module
 - A 60 question test at the end of the overall programme
 - Video examples included
 - Certificates issued to successful attendees
- This is not ideal for Australia but we are through our Referee Committee, working with them to hopefully establish a system along these lines to use to train and accredit Referees in Australia.

New Zealand. As a result of discussions with Gerard DeCourcy (NZ Nominee) we decided that if we could work more closely together and share information then it should be mutually beneficial. Whilst we have already moved in this direction to some extent with Trans-Tasman tests a further step could be attendance at each other's AGMs so that more exchange of information would be possible. Vicki Cardwell attended the Squash New Zealand AGM and workshops on our behalf in November 2014 and has reported very positively on benefits obtained.

Registrations. Almost every country has similar problems to us in regard to low registration percentages compared to active players. Usually about 10%. However there are no strategies or plans established to capture the additional players into a data base or register them in any way. Maybe other countries do. It would be interesting for the WSF to have a worldwide summary to show these figures and how a relatively small percentage of players are contributing to funding of our sport, plus show the level of opportunities, worldwide, to increase.

Oceania Squash Federation Conference and AGM Report



In 2014 Oceania entered its 23rd year of operation. The acceptance of Tahiti Squash Federation as a provisional member brings the OSF membership to ten countries/territories. As at November, 2014, Australia, Cook Islands, Fiji, New Caledonia, New Zealand, Norfolk Island, Papua New Guinea, Samoa, Vanuatu and Tahiti constitute the Oceania Squash Federation.

33,000+ players compete in 700+ squash centres throughout the Oceania Region in regular weekly competitions and tournaments for juniors, seniors and masters. The Australian PSA/WSA Tour and Australian Junior Tour continue to attract players worldwide while development of events continues in Australia, New Zealand, Fiji, Norfolk Island, Cook Islands, New Caledonia and Tahiti.

The 2014 Oceania Junior Championships were held at Palm Beach, Gold Coast, Queensland, Australia in January with 150+ junior players aged 10 to 18 years competing over 4 days. In conjunction with this event the Trans-Tasman rivalry was reignited with 2 test matches between 16 players in 4 age groups from Australia and New Zealand, Australia winning 9/7, 9/7.

The 21st Oceania Masters Championships was held in October in conjunction with the Alice Springs Masters Games, an annual multi-sport Masters competition.

The Oceania Region was represented at the 2014 Commonwealth Games in Glasgow by Australia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea and Norfolk Island.

Australia was successful in the doubles winning 2 gold and 1 bronze and New Zealand winning 1 bronze in the women's singles.

In 2014, the WSF hosted their annual Ambassadors Program in Papua New Guinea with player representatives, Cameron Pilley and Low Wee Wern conducting exhibitions and clinics with school children and the PNG national squad.

Papua New Guinea will host the 2015 Oceania Closed Championships to be held in conjunction with the Pacific Games, 4-18 July. 3 new courts (convertible to 2 doubles courts) will be built in Port Moresby for the event and it is anticipated that all of the island nations who are eligible to compete will participate.

The 2015 Oceania Junior Championships will be held in Invercargill, New Zealand forming a 3 tournament Trans-Tasman series including the Australian and NZ Junior Opens.

Oceania will be hosting the Commonwealth Youth Games in Samoa, 5-12 September, 2015.

Plans to engage member countries in coach education programs have commenced and will be developed and progressed further in 2015.

Games Preparation and Planning

Once again the main area of preparation and planning for the 20th Commonwealth Games very much focused on Doubles as it was ascertained that this is the area where

the Australian Squash Section had the most medal opportunities.

The ACGA paperwork was completed in a timely manner. One issue that we have with our selected athletes is to get responses to our requests for information. I started this process usually weeks out from the final due date. Over the three years leading up to the selection of the Squash Team for the Commonwealth Games the Shadow Squad were involved in several camps and events to showcase potential partnerships and team selection. Athletes selected to compete in the singles matches at the Commonwealth Game were based on the World Tour rankings (PSA and WSA). Doubles tournaments were attended by our athletes in Glasgow, Manchester and Darwin in 2013 and 2014. These events greatly assisted in the team selection. The results gained Australia a higher seeding for the Commonwealth Games.

Prior to arriving in Glasgow, the Australian team met for a camp in London. We gathered in the town of Slough. We trained at the Thames Valley Athletic Club. This was located on the Eton College Campus. This location was perfectly situated for easy access to Heathrow, the venue and getting into London. Holding the camp in the London area enabled players to fly into London Heathrow from wherever they were based or competing, bond with the team to establish team spirit and acclimatize to the UK atmosphere.

The team stayed at the Holiday Inn Express in Slough and transport was a short taxi ride to the courts for training. The Squash squad also used the Holiday Inn Express in Manchester for camps in the earlier preparation. This hotel chain provided the squad with great value.

The 2014 Commonwealth Games performance indicators projected that the squash team, due to the current PSA and WSA World rankings, would aim for between 2 and 4 medals. The result of 3 medals that included 2 Gold Medals and 1 Bronze Medal exceeded our expectation.

Travel

Air – Squash Australia organised to supply the players who were not based in Australia a travel allowance to cover the flights to London for the training camp and depart from Glasgow to their next event. Players and staff who were travelling to and from Australia were included on the ACGA flight program.

Train – The team travelled to Glasgow on a Virgin Train from Euston Station in London to Glasgow Central Station. We were then transferred to the Commonwealth Games Village.

Entries and Accreditation

The process for the Entry and Accreditation from our point was seamless. The onsite Welcoming Centre worked very well and without delay. Our players and staff were able to get through the center quickly and efficiently.

Outfitting

The Australian team received a large quantity of uniforms from two sources – Diadora for competition and training gear and APA for formal and casual wear. The Australian Squash Team was very grateful to receive all the uniforms and equipment that were issued. The team picked up the uniforms on arrival at the village and this was definitely the best scenario. The Diadora playing uniform was suitable for squash. The players all seemed to have an adequate amount of kit and they seemed to like the fit and style. The Coaches and Manager were also provided with plenty of kit. The APA uniform was comfortable and looked terrific.

Games Village Accommodation

The rooms at the village were very good. The village was made up of townhouse units. The Australian team was situated in one area with Australian headquarters, medical, meeting rooms and several storage containers placed in the middle of the Australian camp.

Free WIFI was available in the unit we stayed in and was adequate with very few service interruptions. Laundry facilities were excellent as all participants were issued with laundry bags. You had to drop your laundry off by 10am at designated areas where your laundry would be available for pick up after 7pm same day.

Games Village Dining Hall

Food in the Village was very good and provided 24 hours a day. The selection of food was of a high quality and there was plenty. The dining hall was big enough to hold several thousand at one time.

At Scotstoun Sports Complex only tea, coffee, sports drinks, water, apples, bananas and biscuits were provided. There was a very light lunch service provided to the players and staff. Meal tickets were available through the Sports Information Desk in the Village. This service could definitely have been better as players were often at the venue for 10-12 hours and had to wait to get back to the Village for a meal.

Medical Support

The Australian team had their own medical staff located in a couple of demountable units beside the team headquarters. All players and even staff utilised the Australia team medical headquarters at some point during the event. The players used the physio, massage, ice baths and medical services provided. The Squash team appreciated the medical support and there were no other medical issues to report.

Ground Transport

Bus transport to the Scotstoun Sports Complex ran consistently on time via published schedule and took approximately 20 minutes in both directions. The security check points ran smoothly going into the sports complex and on return to the village. Squash did not require any special transport for the Games. The transport scheduling worked very well.

Communication and Technology

I was provided with a mobile phone for communicating with headquarters. I was able to contact the staff and my coaches easily. The ACGA loaded the phone with the relevant contacts for the Games. The ACGA made available to our athletes a sim card for their phones loaded with forty pounds credit for the athletes use. The village also had dozens of televisions displaying the games action.

Meetings

After the team arrived the Chef de Mission held a team meeting to brief our team and welcome us to the 20th Commonwealth Games. He established a firm set of ground rules that all Australian athletes in the Village will follow. We did have two players who arrived late due to a late appeal and one due to scheduling. The Chef de Mission had the same meeting with these individuals as he did with the team. Every morning there was a Section Manager meeting. These meetings were run by the Chef de Mission and gave a quick overview of the coming day. Each Section was given the opportunity to review their highlights and results from the day before and tell the other sections what they were up to that day. The headquarter staff also gave updates and information from their specific positions and roles. The Squash Section held two technical meetings at the Scotstoun Centre prior to the singles and doubles competitions.

Competition Venue and Training Facility

The venue was first class at the Scotstoun Sports Complex. The six ASB single glass back courts were very well constructed. There was a controlled “mixed” zone that the players were walked through after their matches. The complex had adequate change room facilities and was located centrally to the courts and the Table Tennis courts. There was a good sized player lounge that had tables and couches for players to relax. They had a good warm up area that had stretching area and bikes for warm up and warm downs.

The star of the games was the Glass Court that was made by ASB. This was a state of the art court. It appears that the court and the new rule changes implemented into the doubles was a hit with the participants, spectators and television. A seating capacity of close to 4,000 spectators, the venue had a fantastic atmosphere with great crowds turning up from the very first day.

Singles Competition

Australia played to its seeding in the singles events for the Men and Women.

Doubles Competition

All of our teams started out well winning their pool matches and advanced to the play-off rounds. The changes to the court size and tin height were very well received by the players and spectators. The feedback from the Television coverage and live viewing was that the event was entertaining and easily understood. The Overall Team goal was between 2 and 4 medals. We finished on top of the Gold Medal Tally with two and Australia was the leader. Australia added a Bronze Medal and finished with three medals.

Competition Organisation and Management

The Competition Management team for the Glasgow 2014 Squash competition was excellent. Andrew Shelley was appointed by the WSF. There no real issues with the draws and the running of the competition. We did have practice court allocation time issues but with 28 countries and six courts to train on logistically this was understandably a tough task.

Official Functions

The Squash Section was able to attend the Welcome function the night before the Opening Ceremony. We enjoyed the opportunity to be around the hundreds of other Athletes and Management from the Australian Team. It was particular exciting to be part of that huge group picture on the steps of the venue. The Opening Ceremony was a great experience. Unfortunately, we missed the Closing Ceremony, but for good reason. Our team delivered two Gold Medals and a Bronze Medal on the last day of the event and did not get back on time. We also had Doping Control done on one athlete after the Finals. We may not have been onsite at the closing but we were all out in front of the "BIG SCREEN" in the International Village and we were supporting from there!

Media

The mixed zone worked really well most of the time. It was very effective in the glass court venue. Players were able to speak to the media away from the spectators. The mixed zone in the back court center was a little harder to handle. We encountered a few issues in this area with our second Men's Doubles Team. Some of the questioning was inappropriate and lead to the players needing some assistance from the Section Manager to move along.

Staffing

We had the right amount of staff for a team of ten. Our coaches worked well and scheduling of the matches worked well. We were never caught out with more matches than coaches. Our Section Manager was there to manage and support the team and resolve any issues. This allowed the coaches get on with the training and preparation for matches.

Summary

The Australian Squash Team exceeded their medal predictions and finished in first place as a result of two Gold Medals. The entire team is to be commended on their professionalism and team spirit. Any of the Squash Athletes that were not playing were always in attendance supporting their Australian teammates. They proudly represented Australia and the Australian Commonwealth Games Association at the 20th Commonwealth Games and should be congratulated on all of their efforts.

Finally, I would like to thank the Australian Commonwealth Games Association for the ongoing support that they give to Squash. Your support given to the Squash Australia Program to develop and support the athletes is the reason that we achieved our results in Glasgow.

Men's Doubles Gold Medal Playoff

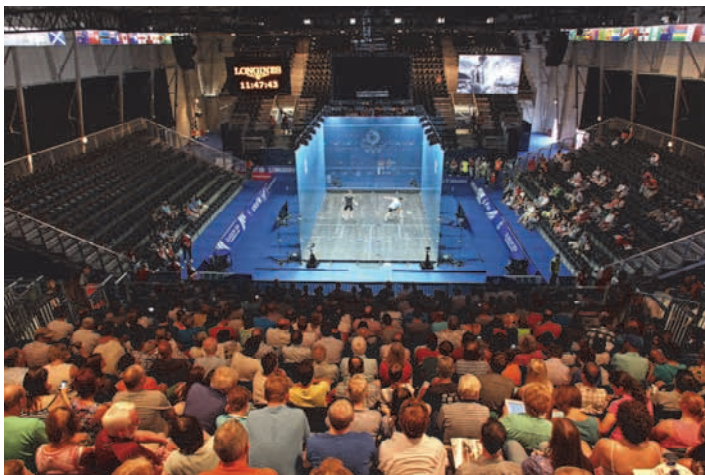

This year saw a total of 20 nations competing with Guatemala making their debut appearance.

The team met at Los Angeles airport and commuted to the host venue arriving 4 days prior to the event starting. The players required this amount of time to recover from jet lag, as it was a 30-hour journey and also a 16-hour time difference.

The venue hosted the Opening and Closing functions along with all meals for the players.

The Team

The overall team morale was excellent. All the girls participated to the best of their ability and the enthusiasm was a pleasure to be part of. Our 3rd round pool match against Wales was vital to Australia finishing in the top 8. Lisa Camilleri played first against a similarly ranked opponent, Lisa played exceptionally with some fantastic boasts and drops creating pressure on her opponent forcing the early error. Winning this first match put Australia into a great 1/0 lead. Rachael Grinham played second and although down 0/2 in very close games managed to play herself back into the match. Rachael won the 3rd game comfortably 11/3. The 4th and 5th games were very close with high quality and entertaining rallies. Rachael walked out winning the 5th game 11/8 to give Australia a 2/0 lead. Sarah Cardwell finished the night off winning 3/0 in the deciding match. This win gave Australia the potential to finish 2nd in our Pool.

The following matches against England, Egypt and France really showed our lack of depth. Although the girls fought all the way the higher quality opponents were too strong. Our final 7/8 position play off against Ireland saw Sarah Cardwell take the first rubber 3/0, then Rachael who had not been afforded a rest day during the event had another tough match but secured the tie for us winning 11/8 in the 5th.

The team was very happy with a 7th finish and for Christine Nunn and Sarah Cardwell gained invaluable

experience. The Australian Team was a pleasure to be involved with.

Australian Closed Championship 2014 Report



Squash & Racquetball Victoria co-hosted the Australian Closed Championships with Squash Australia at the Mulgrave Country Club, Wheelers Hill,

Victoria. The Club was a major sponsor of the event and the newly refurbished courts and excellent associated facilities at the Club provided for a very successful tournament.

The Closed had not been held since 2009 and this was a great opportunity to once again provide Australia's top players with a tilt at a national title. Both Open's carried a purse of \$15,000 each and were registered as National Closed events on the PSA and WSA circuits.

In the Women's Open, our 2014 World Women's Team Championship members fought out the top four placing's with former world no 1 and current Australian no 1, Rachael Grinham obtaining her first Australian Closed (in fact, first Australian title), with a 11-7, 11-4, 11-4 victory over Lisa Camilleri. "It's been a really busy couple of months, I've just arrived back from Canada (World Women's Teams) a couple of days ago, playing this event and then leaving for Egypt (World Open). I think

this is the first Australian Closed Championship I've actually played in," said Grinham. In the play-off for third placing, Christine Nunn defeated Sarah Cardwell 11-3, 12-14, 9-11, 11-6, 11-8 in a hard fought match lasting over seventy minutes.

The Men's Open again resulted in the top four seeds playing off for the finals. New South Welshman, Ryan Cuskelly surprised even himself in defeating compatriot and higher ranked Cameron Pilley 12-10, 12-10, 12-10. Cuskelly fought his way back from 8-10 down in the third to take the match. Pilley, currently ranked 18th in the world, had no answer for the energetic Cuskelly, currently ranked 44. "I didn't really expect that to be honest," Cuskelly said. "This week I just relaxed and tried to have fun. That's how I should play all the time. I tried a few more shots and they came off." Melbourne's Rex Hedrick defeated Steve Finitsis 5-11, 11-7, 11-9, 11-7 for third placing.

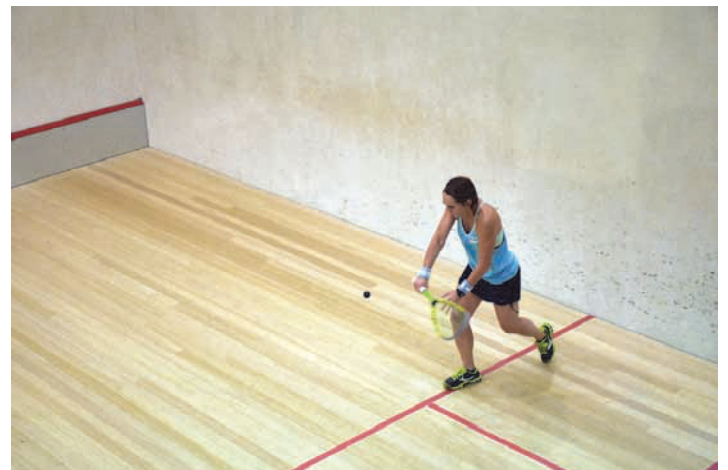

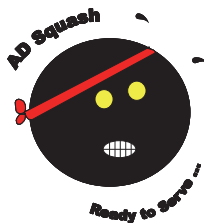

2014 has been a year of major achievement for Squash in the ACT. However, we have further important issues to

Our major achievements have included:

- Substantial improvement to the ACT's largest squash facility, the Woden Centre. Utilising an ACT Government grant, all courts have been sanded and painted, electrics brought up to commercial standards and ongoing work completed on the roof. In 2015 we are aiming to obtain a further grant to continue with the repairs and maintenance works. Our objective is to have the Woden Centre in excellent condition by the end of 2016.
- A significant further improvement in profitability, which, together with a new mortgage with the Bendigo Bank, has enabled Squash ACT to rationalise our debts. Squash ACT now has a sustainable business, which we intend to grow further over the next three years.
- Preparation and submission to the ACT Government of a Facilities Plan to ensure squash in the ACT remains viable in the medium

and longer term. With this plan, we are now engaged with, and in a position to influence, the ACT Government as it plans future sporting facilities in the Territory. (In the coming five years, the ACT will see 14 new courts built (six will be delivered in 2015) with the potential loss of six old courts.)

Importantly the Facilities Plan identified a 17% growth in social squash bookings in the past three years. Pennant and other competitions have tendered to plateau, although with new facilities coming online in the next few years it is expected that the sport will begin to grow.

Juniors have continued to grow with the addition of Anthony Ricketts as their coach. We have also seen Peter Nuttall win the Australian U/15 championships and also represent Australia overseas.

In recent times we have seen our long serving CEO Sam Paterson depart. The Board and players would like to thank Sam for the work she did during very difficult times.

During the past 12 months we have been negotiating with Newcastle Squash and Illawarra Squash Associations to join NSW Squash and I am happy to report they are now affiliated with NSW Squash.

I must acknowledge the support we have had from Squash Australia during the past 12 months. I also must acknowledge the Office of Sport and Recreation in the NSW Department of Communities for their financial and administrative assistance.

"...the focus of ORS for the next four years is to deliver on the Government's Strategic Plan Target 83 – Sport and recreation: Increase the proportion of South Australians participating in sport or physical recreation at least once per week to 50% by 2020.

Strategic Priorities:

1. *Build a capable and sustainable industry*
2. *Deliver better places to participate and perform. Increased funding to keep the doors open or to redevelop existing infrastructure is required in all areas.*

3. *Achieve sporting excellence - Increased funding in grass roots areas will assist in achieving the Governments Strategic Plan Target 83*

Throughout the year, the Board, Advisory Committees and staff have remained true to the Association's values of integrity and respect, embracing quality and excellence, collaboration and transparency, and have ethically acted in the best interests of the squash and racquetball membership.

The Board has set a clear long-term vision for SRASA in a multifaceted approach that spreads risk and provides solid foundations that will deliver both commercial and participation dividends.

In doing so, the Board and General Manager have needed to manage the following complex issues over the past 12 months, each aligned to the government's strategic priority areas:

Build a capable and sustainable industry

A priority has been to generate the revenue capacity of the licensed venue whilst balancing the state wide promotion and development of squash and racquetball.

The Board finalised a comprehensive investigation into the financial, operational and management benefits for the Licensed Club (Racquets SA). The study explored a number of different business cases including substitute management models for the Club. The Board has committed to retain the Licensed Club and to review this policy position in three years (2017).

As the financial future of Squash SA is inextricably linked to the effective operations of the Licensed Club, the Board has committed to undertake strategies that improve the return on this investment. Internal refurbishments, capital upgrades, branding and resourcing, as well as a communication strategy are included in forward budgets. Over the next three years, the Board and Finance and Risk Committee will continue to review commercial diversification and options aligned with legislative and market conditions.

Deliver better places to participate and perform

Squash SA has worked progressively with government to ensure the multi-use squash court is at the forefront of sporting hub design. Squash SA has actively lobbied for the inclusion of multi-use squash courts at the following developments - Campbelltown, Pt Pirie, Uni SA City West, Fleurieu Peninsula, Playford, Whyalla, and Gawler.

South Australia's changing demographics are impacting undesirably on all but a small minority of high profile sports that dominate the sporting landscape. Squash

and Racquetball Pennant Competition Player numbers remain consistent (albeit not in decline).

However, the participation barometer for squash and racquetball growth in South Australia leans toward in-house and social market forces. The Board has incorporated fundamental growth strategies that target in-house, social and Corporate Cup formats in the forward Strategic Plan.

Achieve sporting excellence - Increase grass roots participation

The Board has remained committed to, and has delivered upon, key platforms which flow from our vision and purpose.

As the peak sporting body, the Board, Advisory Committees and staff have worked alongside member clubs to secure, grow, administer and showcase the sports of squash and racquetball. The Board remains dedicated to deliver against objectives that achieve sporting excellence by increasing grassroots participation. The Boards focus is to:

- Provide clear direction to affiliated clubs/venues
- Provide assistance and support to clubs/venues that support our vision
- Encourage clubs/venues to provide quality facilities to play squash and racquetball
- Initiate opportunities for increased participation
- Manage and grow assets to maximise the return for the benefit of squash and racquetball
- Facilitate pathways for players, coaches and officials to reach their potential.

Our relationship with Primary and Secondary schools at their local Squash Centre as the conduit to grass roots squash continues to grow. During 2014, approximately 12,000 students attended Squash SA School programs.

At the sporting excellence end of the paradigm:

- Squash SAs 2014 State Junior Team achieved their best results in 17 years at the Australian Junior Championships, and
- The Squash Australia Junior Team selection saw four South Australian players chosen to represent Australia, a record number for Squash SA players selected in a single National team.

In closing, and on behalf of the Board, we thank our members for their support and look forward to further strengthening the capacity of the sports of Squash and Racquetball in the 12 months ahead.

2014 was a year of consolidation in the governance reform process with the Board launching its 2014 – 2016 strategic plan, empowering a number of new subcommittees and appointing two new independent Directors in Bruce Whittaker and Matthew O'Brien. Both Directors come from strong financial and risk management backgrounds and have already begun to assist the organisation with improvements in both areas. In the latter part of the year, with facilitation from Vicsport, the Board completed a skills audit and evaluation of its performance. A number of recommendations will see the further embedding and strengthening of the governance practises developed over the last two years with robust systems in place that will meet and exceed industry benchmarks.

The new trading name, Squash & Racquetball Victoria came into place early in the year followed by the new logo. The Board has recognised the growth of racquetball as a complementary activity to squash and adopted the new branding to support and unite both sports.

The Regional Facility Strategy study, funded through Sport & Recreation Victoria and conducted by InsideEDGE Leisure Planners was completed in late

2014. The two final documents – Strategy Summary and Background Report – are a comprehensive coverage of the state of play in regional Victoria and a guideline for, not only facility redevelopment and future provision but an advocacy platform from which to resurrect and promote our sports. Sincere thanks to Adrian Wilson and the team at InsideEDGE for their hard work, interest and commitment to the project.

Squash & Racquetball Victoria completed the third year of its women and girls' participation project funded by the Victorian Health Promotion Foundation's (VicHealth) State Sporting Association Participation Program and secured a further 12 months funding while the Program is reviewed. The learn-to-play program, *Hits & Giggles*, has now introduced over 500 new women into the sports of squash and racquetball with 19 clubs/venues around Victoria supporting the program. Regardless of the funding outcome, *Hits & Giggles* will continue in 2015 with S&RV looking to encourage more clubs and venues to become involved.

Squash Australia's national junior introductory program *OzSquash* was to be rolled out to clubs and venues in 2014. Unfortunately, the program content has yet to be completed however, two clubs, Cobden and Monash University ran hybrid programs. The Active After School Communities (AASC) program will be replaced in 2015 with the government's new Sporting Schools activity. While we are still unsure as to the exact format of delivery, the *OzSquash In-School* program will see

squash and racquetball well placed to partner schools in the project providing a good supply of community coaches are available.

The Victorian Open continues to thrive, moving up in stature to a \$30k event (equally split between Men's and Women's Opens), again the largest of the State Opens on the Australian Squash Tour thanks to the continued support of our major sponsors – Kooyong Lawn Tennis Club, Victorian Government and Mulgrave Country Club. Squash & Racquetball Victoria was delighted to have Australia's no 1 and 3 women in Rachael Grinham and Donna Urquhart contest the final, with Donna securing her first ever win over Rachael for the title. In the men's final Max Lee (HKG) defeated second time runner up Mohd Nafizwan Adnan (MAS) for his maiden Vic Open crown. Both Open finals and semi-finals were web streamed live and replayed on demand to a world-wide audience of over 7,000.

Squash in regional Victoria is enjoying a boost in profile with Shepparton playing host to the inaugural Shepparton International PSA Tour event sponsored by the City of Greater Shepparton. A full field of international and Australian players contested the tournament with Queensland's Matt Hopkin securing his first PSA title. The success of the event has secured a further three year's funding from the Council. Thanks to the Goulburn Valley Squash Club for their invaluable support and contribution. The City of Bendigo was keen to follow Shepparton's lead and has recently promised three year's support from 2015 for the Bendigo International (Men's and Women's Opens). Squash & Racquetball Victoria looks forward to working with both Clubs in producing great events, greater profile and demonstrating squash can provide a return on investment.

Squash & Racquetball Victoria again received funding from Squash Australia to support our elite player program – Squash & Racquetball Victoria Academy, Targeted Athlete Program and Talent Development Squad - activities. Group and individual coaching opportunities were provided for along with sports science components and travel assistance.

Development activities to be carried out such as coaching sessions, refereeing sessions, talent squad sessions, committee member assistance and advice as to how to access funding opportunities etc.

Pennant

The number of Pennant players has again declined slightly. The major positive was the return of University of Western Australia teams to the competition. We were also able to introduce a new State Grade Squash Interim Competition with teams competing for the Ken Watson Trophy.

City of Perth International Squash Challenge

The 2014 event attracted 141 players (47 in PSA, 34 in WSA and 60 in Local events). For the first time in the history of the event that has been conducted since 1951, an Australian player did not win at least one of the Men's or Ladies events. Jan Koukal (Czech Republic) was victorious in the PSA event and Milou Van Der Heijden (Netherlands) took out the WSA event to emphasise the international element of the City of Perth International Squash Challenge.

Australian Junior Championships

WA Squash was proud to host the 2014 Australian Junior Championships. 211 players participated in the event which was very successful largely due to the financial contribution of the Department of Sport and Recreation, the efforts of Mark Bridle and a large group of volunteers who devoted much time and effort to ensuring that every aspect of the Championships ran smoothly. The Western Australian team performed very well to finish third overall in the Teams Event. Gregory Chan won the Boys under 11 title with Erin Classen finishing as runner up in the Girls Under 11 event. William Curtis (Boys Under 17), Oscar Curtis (Boys Under 11) and Olympia Bennett (Girls Under 11) all finished third in their respective events.

Referees

A major referee training and assessment program was conducted in conjunction with the 2014 City of Perth International Squash Challenge to help prepare referees for the Australian Junior Championships held later in the year.

Hall of Fame

During the year four additional former players (Cath Bellemore, Dianne Davis, Debra Majteles and Barbara Oldfield) were inducted into the Western Australian Hall of Fame. The four formed the nucleus of the teams that won 5 Australian Women's Team titles between 1981 and 1987 with all four being ranked in the top seven in Australia in 1983/84. Stephen Bowen was awarded Life Membership of WA Squash with Stella Brown (Cambridge) and Lyn Moffatt (Mullaloo) being recognised with Service to WA Squash Awards.

Information Technology

We are very appreciative of the funding received from the Department of Sport and Recreation via a Sport 4 All Club-Talk Grant for an ICT Systems Audit, Development & Implementation program. Such funding has enabled us to improve our overall I/T capabilities and again evidences the vital role that the D.S.R. plays in assisting sporting organisations in this State.

Funding

WA Squash would like to acknowledge the financial assistance and support provided by the Department of Sport and Recreation, Healthway and City of Perth. Such funding is the cornerstone of the continuing growth and development of Squash in Western Australia.

Staff

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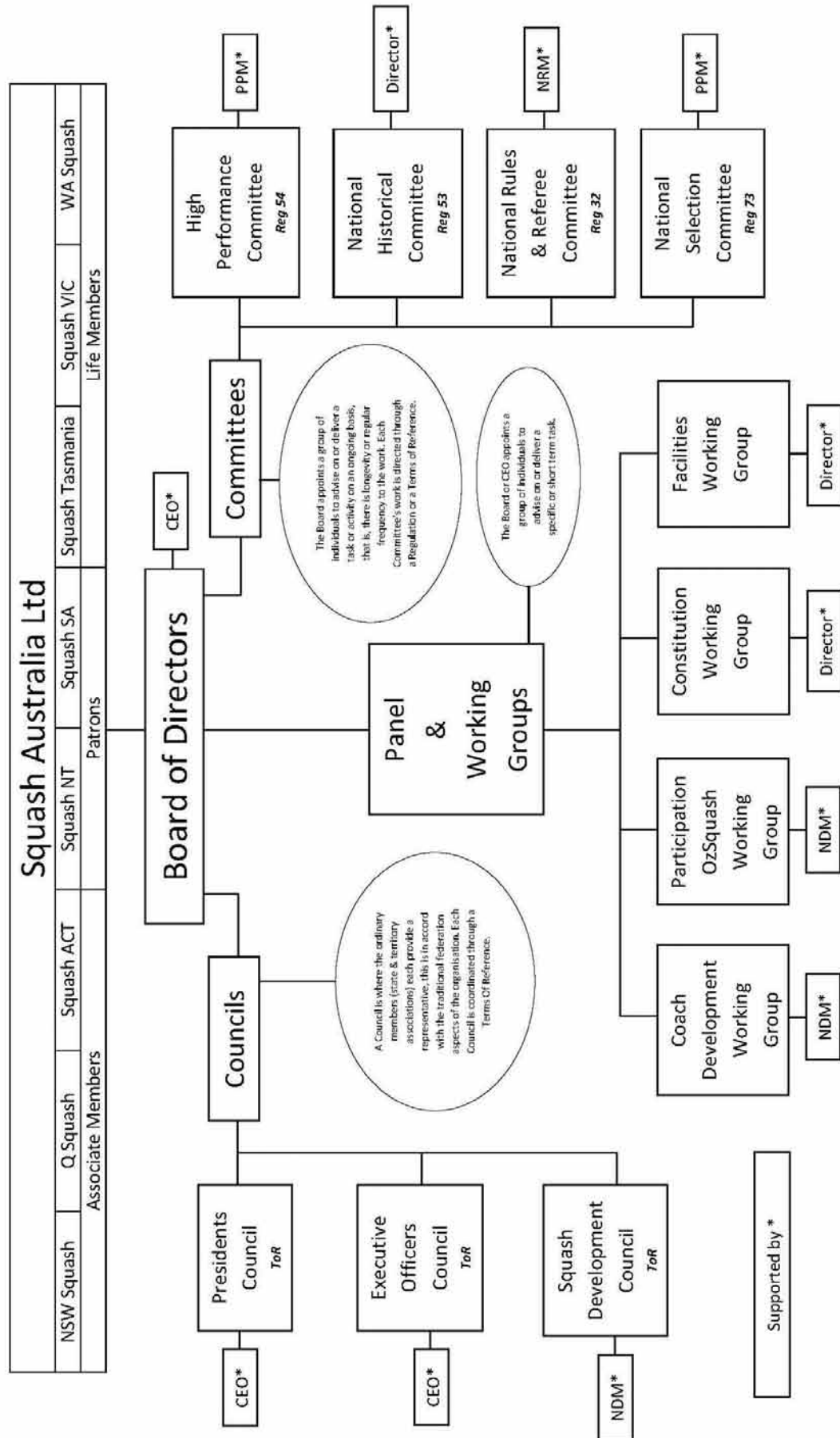
