The Assistant Vice President will have broad authority to shape and grow the development program, including annual giving, major gifts, planned giving, parent giving, athletic fundraising, donor relations, and prospect research. The Assistant Vice President will be responsible for building broad-based private support for the institution through the management of integrated, comprehensive programs, and will play a key role in developing the culture of philanthropy at Richmond. The Assistant Vice President will ensure that development staff are efficiently, effectively, and productively engaged in their fundraising work, assuring that prospects are effectively cultivated, solicited, and stewarded. The Assistant Vice President will serve as a member of the Vice President's leadership team and has management responsibility for a staff of 33, of whom six are direct reports.

Located minutes from the vibrant capital city of Richmond, Virginia, the University of Richmond is a premier, private liberal arts institution that blends the intimacy of a small college with academic, research, and cultural opportunities typically found at larger universities. A comprehensive School of Arts and Sciences anchors Richmond as a nationally recognized liberal arts university. Nationally ranked business and law schools, the nation's first school of leadership studies, a celebrated international education program, and a community-focused School of Professional and Continuing Studies provide a combination of undergraduate and graduate programs that distinguish the University of Richmond in American higher education.

The power of a University of Richmond education comes in the countless endeavors that go beyond the expected, that heighten every aspect of its students' educational experience. Industry-leading financial aid ensures that talented students of all backgrounds can come together to form a transformative educational environment. Richmond guarantees every student up to \$4,000 for a summer research or internship experience.

In 2018, Richmond tied for first in the bachelor's institutions category of universities producing the most Fulbright U.S. Scholars. *U.S. News & World Report's* Best Colleges 2020 guide ranked Richmond #23 overall and #24 for "Best Value" among national liberal arts colleges. Richmond also was named to the "Most Innovative Schools" list and ranked #10 among national liberal arts colleges. *The Princeton Review* recognized Richmond as #2 for "Best Career Services" in the 2020 edition of its college guide and Richmond has again been named to *Kiplinger's Personal Finance's* list of the 400 Best College Values for 2019.

PRIMARY RESPONSIBILITIES

The Assistant Vice President of Development will

- lead, manage, and support a team of development and operations staff;
- in collaboration with the Vice President, agree on methods of measuring performance, and set and meet challenging targets for the team and individual members of the staff;
- in collaboration with the Vice President and the Assistant Vice President for Academic Advancement and Strategic Priorities, university cabinet members, and academic faculty, develop fundraising priorities and advance proposals in support of fundraising;
- in collaboration with the Assistant Vice President for Advancement Systems, utilize and manage a wide range of analytical tools to drive strategy, decision making, and reporting;
- work closely with the university controller's office, university counsel, and advancement leadership to craft and seek timely approval for gift agreements;
- model effective collaboration across Advancement including working with the Advancement leadership team to develop a set of shared divisional goals that include fundraising and engagement metrics;
- develop, implement, and monitor diverse fundraising programs to maximize fundraising success and meet divisional fundraising goals;
- serve on the leadership team for fundraising strategy, including the planning and implementation of a capital campaign;
- identify and maximize opportunities to positively position the university with key constituencies;
- personally manage and advance a small portfolio of high level donors and prospective donors;

- monitor and manage all relevant budgets and expenditures, ensuring full compliance with university policies and procedures.

She came to Richmond in 2017 following 14 years of fundraising and fundraising management at Yale University, including the Annual, Leadership, and Major Gifts offices, as well as overseeing development for the Faculty of Arts & Sciences. Callaghan has extensive experience in the direct fundraising of

major gifts as well as managing and developing fundraising teams. She began her career working in both program development and fundraising for museums in Virginia, Connecticut, and Kentucky. Callaghan is a native of Williamsburg, Virginia and an alumna of Yale, where she is an active volunteer.

Michelle Wamsley is the University of Richmond's Assistant Vice President for Academic Advancement and Strategic Priorities. In this capacity, she works with academic leadership to identify and advance institutional funding priorities, and oversees the principal gifts program, as well as the Office of Foundation, Corporate & Government Relations. Prior to joining the University of Richmond in 2009, Wamsley spent 12 years at the University of Virginia, most recently serving as the UVA Health System's

Director of Foundation and Corporate Relations. With a background that includes annual, major gift, and grateful patient fundraising, she has presented, lectured, and trained others on topics ranging from proposal writing to healthcare philanthropy to nonprofit board development and, most recently, leading from the middle in academic institutions.

- a collaborative approach to leadership;
- the ability to interface with a significant number and wide diversity of people and programs to optimize performance;
- diplomacy, tact, exceptional communication and interpersonal skills, and unquestioned integrity;
- proven leadership and management skills;
- experience working through a capital campaign;
- the ability to set the tone for a department driven by values based on professionalism, productivity, responsiveness, a strong work ethic, responsibility, collaboration, open communication, mutual respect, and achievement;
- flexibility and the demonstrated ability to thrive in a complex environment, juggling numerous projects and satisfying numerous constituencies simultaneously;
- an ability to serve as a motivator and mentor to staff while increasing the level of performance and accountability;
- a strong history and track record of working effectively with volunteers, faculty, and administrators, engaging them in the life of the institution and assisting them in improving their effectiveness in all aspects of fundraising;

A bachelor's degree is required for this position. At least ten years of direct fundraising experience with a proven track record of soliciting and closing gifts of \$1 million or more in a comprehensive campaign context is preferred as is an advanced degree.

LOCATION

This position is located in Richmond, Virginia. Richmond has recently been named a *Travel + Leisure* Top Destination and *National Geographic* highlighted Richmond as a top place to travel for food.

The James River was the centerpiece of Virginia's capital as a shipping and transportation hub, but today it lies at the heart of Richmond's vibrant outdoor culture. Kayakers and other thrill-seekers flock to the river to take advantage of its Class IV whitewater rapids, with excitement peaking at the boatercross and freestyle competitions of Dominion Riverrock, an annual festival celebrating Richmond's wide array of outdoor recreation. *Outside* magazine named Richmond as its 2012 "Best River Town."

Beyond the riverbanks, climbers can enjoy scaling the walls that surround the old quarry pond on Belle Isle, while hiking enthusiasts can hit the dirt of the Buttermilk and North Bank trails, which provide surprising oases of unspoiled nature in the middle of the city. Maymont Park, Byrd Park, and Lewis Ginter Botanical Gardens offer acres of outside space for reading, pick-up games, and concerts, while tiny pocket parks dot the medians and alleys of the historic Fan District.

With an abundance of visual arts, theater, and dance, Richmond is more than the political capital of Virginia — it's also the arts capital. The city's low cost of living combined with the presence of the University of Richmond and Virginia Commonwealth University's School of the Arts have encouraged the growth of an exciting, dynamic, and boundary-pushing arts community. The Virginia Museum of Fine Arts, one of the nation's top art museums, is an anchor for the community, attracting high-profile exhibitions of work by internationally renowned artists such as Dale Chihuly and Pablo Picasso; the Institute of Contemporary Art provides the city with another powerhouse museum. The city has also developed a flourishing street art scene, most notably represented by the five-year Richmond Mural Project and the colorful former GRTC bus depot, a product of the 2013 Richmond Street Art Festival.

In the performing arts, Richmond has more than half a dozen independently operating theaters, including Virginia Repertory, central Virginia's flagship professional theater, and the Richmond Triangle Players, a leading voice in the LGBT community. Richmond CenterStage, one of the city's largest performing arts organizations, offers touring and local theater, dance, and opera performances at the fully restored 1928 Carpenter Theatre, including select performances through the University's Modlin Center for the Arts. The historic Landmark Theater (formerly known as the Mosque and the site of the famous "The Kiss" photograph of teen heartthrob and musical icon Elvis) faces Monroe Park.

Richmond also has a reputation for fantastic restaurants, including one of *Bon Appetit's* top 10 new restaurants in America, and is home to over 30 craft breweries.
