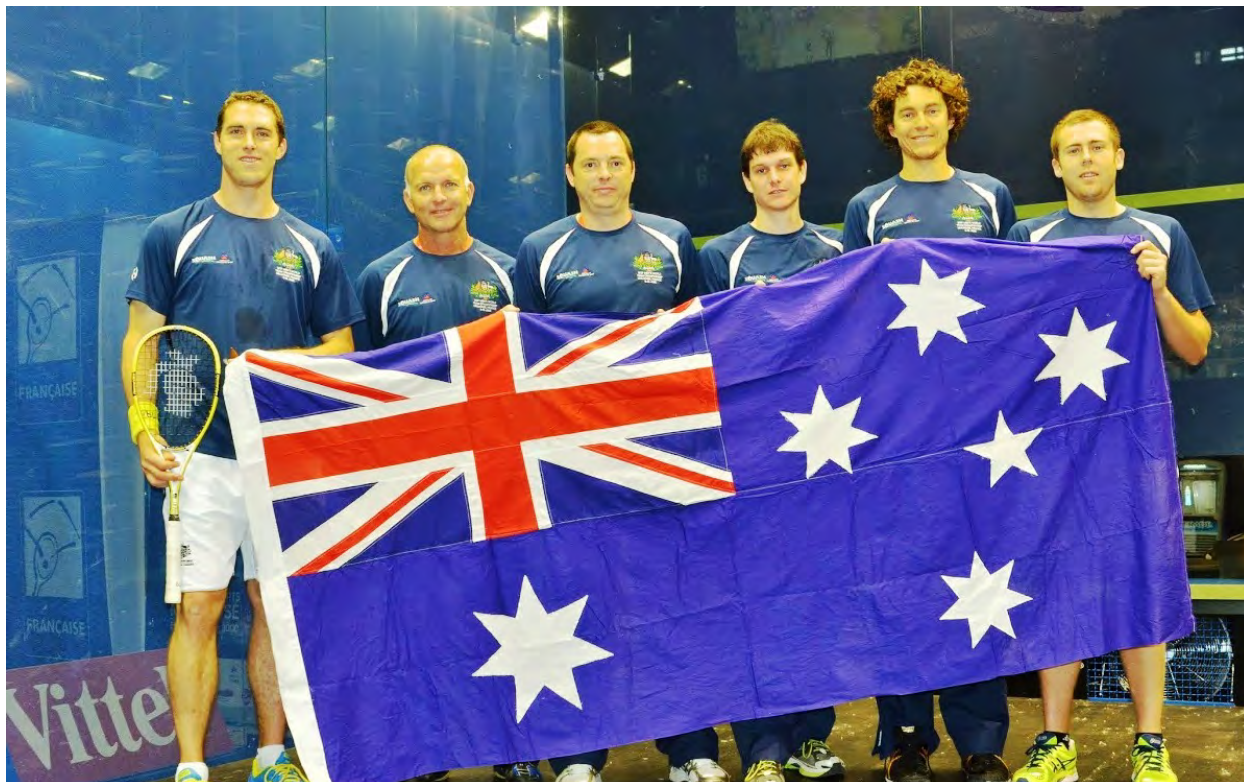

President's Report



1. It is my pleasure to deliver to you the Squash Australia Ltd President's Report for 2014.

2. Unusually, it has been several months longer than a year since the 2013 report. This is a result of two major events which have occurred

since the last AGM, and which will have significant ongoing effects on Squash Australia, being:

- (a) the Squash Australia Governance Review;
- (b) the implementation of the ASC "Australia's Winning Edge" program.

3. The clear message to be obtained from both the Winning Edge and the Governance Review process is that sporting bodies in general, and Squash Australia in particular, need to embrace changes to:

- (a) become more business like in the way in which we carry out our functions;
- (b) become more accountable to our stakeholders, not the least of whom are our member States and Territories, and the ASC;
- (c) become more self-directing in the achievement of our goals; and
- (d) become more self-reliant in finding the resources needed to achieve our objectives.

WINNING EDGE

4. The impacts and changes caused by the Winning Edge Program ("AWE") following its announcement in November 2012 has been guided by our very capable CEO, Mr Gary O'Donnell, and the Squash Australia Staff. We are all indebted to them for their good work, which will be ongoing through a transition period into 2014.

5. In April 2013, the funding outcome for Squash Australia was announced. Until such time as we complete the process of making Squash Australia (and its Members) independent of government funding, we are reliant on the government of the day (through the ASC) for our financial security. The funding provided by the April 2013 announcement has allowed us to proceed consistently with our Strategic Plan, albeit with our 'belts tightened'. While there is never any shortage of programs and projects which could promote the sport if we had more funding for the time being, however, the outlook under AWE continues to be positive.

6. The most significant change to the Squash landscape driven by AWE was that the AIS no longer directly manages sport programs. The Squash unit was, as a result, closed late in 2013. The program has been under the stewardship of Byron Davis who concluded his position in December. I thank Byron for his forthright and dedicated work on the program, and wish him well in his future ventures, squash related and otherwise.

GOVERNANCE REVIEW

7. The implementation of the Governance Review recommendations became a key area of work for Squash Australia Members, the Board and staff through 2013. A set of amendments to the Articles was implemented while planning commenced on the largest task in the Review, the drafting of a new Constitution for Squash Australia which will replace the Articles and Memorandum of Association.

8. The membership gave its approval to form a working group comprising Carol Kawaljenko, Peta Murphy and Bob McComas. The working group toiled solidly through the early part of 2014 to generate multiple successive drafts of the Constitution to incorporate the recommendations made by the Independent Governance Review Committee. Once approved by the members the net effect of the constitutional changes will be to facilitate achievement of the objectives mentioned above, in terms of being more business like and professional, more accountable, and giving scope to the sport to be more self-reliant in terms of funding.

9. I thank the committee of Carol, Peta and Bob (in particular Carol herself, who took a lead role in the drafting process), and the representatives of each of the members of Squash Australia who made themselves available to discuss and debate the content of the Constitution. It was self-evident from the various meetings held to discuss the proposed changes that there was a divergence of views in a variety of areas.

10. I commend the efforts of those who went to the trouble to formulate and express their view in such an open and forthright manner. I feel very confident that each and every person who wished to express a view about any aspect of the review process and the recommended outcomes had ample opportunity to do so, and indeed took advantage of that opportunity. I also believe that the collected wisdom and experience of the members will operate to bring about reasonable resolution to any points of divergence, to find "common ground". The result, in my opinion, is that we will have a Constitution which will serve us well going forward, and will support the achievement of our objectives.

PLAYER MEMBERSHIP

11. One of our major objectives must be to increase our player numbers, in particular those in the junior ranks. In this area I must acknowledge two projects in particular:

- (a) OzSquash - our introductory program for 5 – 12 year olds is blossoming particularly through the initial delivery focus of Active After School Centres. The future challenge is for our clubs and centres to embrace the subsequent stages and bring these youngsters into the centres; and

(b) Australian Junior Squash tour - with over 70 events recognised and 1,000 youngsters identified in its first year, this has been a resounding success!

COMMUNICATION

12. The new Constitution continues to encourage information exchange between Squash Australia Stakeholders. Those communication channels have continued throughout this past year, and will serve us well in the future. I refer to:

- (a) EOC meetings;
- (b) SDC meetings;
- (c) Presidents Councils;
- (d) working Groups;
- (e) workshops preceding the AGM;
- (f) the AGM itself.

13. I have noticed over the last four years, since the implementation of the Presidents Council, that it has developed to be a very important forum for the exchange of views and information. Although the discussion at times can be what might be called "forthright" or "robust", the assembled experience and wisdom of the participants tends to have a moderating effect on what might at times be seen as extreme or unfounded views, and it has become an important part of the processes by which the Members are able to indicate to the Board how they feel, as a group, about various issues.

14. Building on the success of this forum, there is no reason why other methodologies for information exchange cannot, and should not, be established. This is, of course, in line with both the Governance Review recommendations, and the new Constitution.

THE BOARD

15. I give my sincere thanks to my fellow Board Members, for their dedication to the task of guiding the entity through difficult and challenging times over the last year. The mere fact of attendance at the many meetings (both face to face meetings and tele conference meetings) the Board holds throughout the year involves a selfless dedication that is deserving of appreciation. In addition, your Board members are required to peruse large volumes of material prior to the meetings, and be in a position to rationally discuss the many and varied issues that arise. I thank each member of the Board for putting in that effort, which is essential to ensuring that issues are discussed and determined in a democratic manner, after all relevant facts have been properly considered.

16. I must single out for particular thanks my colleague on the Board, Marcus Smith, who has been the architect of the ongoing development of Matrix. As a result of the direction given by the members to the Board in 2011, through the unanimous decisions to acquire Matrix and endorse it for universal use, the Board has caused Matrix to be further developed to be more useful and user friendly, and this has largely been a result of the efforts of Marcus. Thank you again.

17. In any organisation, there is always a dynamic tension between the objective of unity, and the desire that the organisation's processes and personnel be subjected to appropriate scrutiny to ensure goals are being met, and complacency does not set in. The Constitutional Review has certainly ensured that goals and performance have been in the spotlight, and properly so. Now that we have completed that review process and implementation of the new Constitution is near, I anticipate an era of unity of purpose amongst the organisation and its members, reflective of the fact that we have spent so much time identifying who we are, what we want, and how we are to get it.

18. That unity, of course, is fundamental to the achievement of purposes, and will underscore our objectives of increasing player numbers, and improving our standings both locally and internationally.

19. It is part of the role of the Board to optimise the conditions for that unity to surface. The capacity of the Board to do this is a function of the range of talent and experience resident in the members of the Board.

20. The Constitutional Review process highlighted the prospect of Squash Australia benefiting from having Board members from a wider experience base than may have typically occurred in the past. We have set about to put this principle into effect, by making it known publicly that we are seeking expressions of interest from persons who might be able to serve on the Board. The responses we have received strongly support the conclusion that there is indeed a pool of talent available to us, and that we should seek to take advantage of it.

THE GAME INTERNATIONALLY

21. On the international scene, we have in the last couple of years seen a very significant demonstration of unity amongst the 147 Squash playing Nations of the World. This was, of course, our bid to be included in the Summer Olympics. As is now well known, although Squash made it to the last three under consideration (Wrestling, Softball/Baseball and Squash), we ultimately lost out to Wrestling. Whilst this is very disappointing, the thing to remember is that in this life, the only true constant is change. The position is not carved in stone.

22. I am far from convinced that it is the fate of Squash to never be admitted to the Summer Olympics. Indeed, it would not be a surprise to me to find that the change in leadership in the IOC (from Jacques Rogge to Thomas Bach) might lead to a different attitude towards the notion of a fixed number of sports, and a fixed number of disciplines. I can see plenty of scope for recalibrating various of the integers that go to make up the composition of the body of athletes at the Olympics, so as to include Squash (and probably Softball/Baseball as well). So I would encourage everyone to see this as a step along the journey, rather than a disappointing conclusion to it.

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23. Australia is categorised as a 'Major National Federation' of the World Squash Federation, a responsibility which is never shied away from by the Board. Australian teams competed in the World Men's Team Championships, World Junior Women's Teams Championships and the World Games throughout the year.

24. I had the honour to represent the organisation at the World Squash Federation AGM held in Christchurch, New Zealand, in October 2013. Our Trans-Tasman colleagues did a wonderful job hosting the gathering. Meeting documents have been distributed to the Member States and Territories. Although having just received the Olympic bid result, the tempo and enthusiasm of the many delegates remained hopeful and upbeat.

25. The WSF initiated a player recognition system 'SPIN', to take effect from 2014. A SPIN number will need to be generated for all players who wish compete in WSF authorised competitions, whether they play in the Commonwealth Games, World Masters or World Junior Tour events.

26. Australia is the leading squash nation in Oceania and supports the efforts of the fledgling Oceania Squash Federation in its work. The re-institution of the Oceania Junior Championships in January 2014 on the Gold Coast being but one example of assisting the OSF.

COMMONWEALTH GAMES

27. The pinnacle events for Squash are the World Championships, and the Commonwealth Games. We are well placed to contribute towards Australian success in July-August 2014 at Glasgow, and I look forward to seeing our Athletes in action there.

28. Whilst we have one eye on the 2014 Commonwealth Games another eye is predictably focused on 2018 Gold Coast. I am reliably informed that the Gold Coast Organising Committee (GOCOG) is going to bring the whole project online within time, and under budget.

It is a truly exciting time for the sport in Australia, not the least for our juniors, who will have the opportunity to compete in this very exciting event.

29. In the last five years, we have explored the possibility of holding the Australian Open as a major sporting event whilst holding the open in Canberra in 2010, 2011 and 2012 resulted in a net loss of funds, we have gained significant experience through the exercise. Regrettably, the Board felt obliged in the economic circumstances prevailing not to hold the Australian Open in 2013. I know there are many who consider that the Open should be held in some format every year, and I believe the result of discussion on the point is that there will be an Open in 2014, and in each year thereafter.

30. I thank the Board and Committee Members of each of our Members' organisations who give so much to our great sport, while often receiving little or no recognition for the many hours of dedication and hard work. Thankyou, every one of you. Without your efforts, we would have no sport to administer.

31. On behalf of Squash Australia and its Members, please allow me to acknowledge the many in our workforce, the referees, the selectors, the event managers, team coaches and managers and Squash Australia staff who efficiently and effectively deal with the conduct and delivery of our sport. I also thank our players for their dedication to the game, our juniors and their parents, and the Court operators who make their facilities available for us to play what is one of the best games ever conceived.

32. On behalf of the Squash Australia Ltd Board, might your efforts of the past translate in 2014 into the success we as a sport truly deserve.

Chief Executive Officer Report



2013 was a year of challenges for Squash Australia. A Governance Review report with a sweeping set of recommendations for the members to consider, Australia's sporting system undergoing its largest ever 'makeover' with the Australian Government's Australia's Winning Edge being implemented and ambitious development initiatives with Oz Squash, the Australian Junior Squash Tour and a new Coaching Framework to be completed.

All of this of course to be undertaken while Australian Teams represented at the Men's and Junior Women's World Teams Championships, World Games and Australian Championships for Juniors, Junior Open and Doubles were to be conducted around the nation.

This 2013 Squash Australia Annual Report will provide details on these activities, the performances of Australia's players and teams over the year and the organisation's efforts in a general sense and I encourage you to read it fully.

I will however take this opportunity in my report to highlight a number of areas of Squash Australia's work, our partners and the Board's activity.

Since its endorsement by the members *Squash in Australia* has challenged the national body to expand beyond areas such as the conduct of Australian Championships and presenting Australian Teams to also playing a role in Participation, Development and Facilities.

These latter items have been in the context of working with the member State and Territory Squash Associations to, where possible, unify operations for improved efficiency, presentation and savings.

- The National Insurance program - with its Public Liability Insurance Program available to affiliated clubs and centres, the Management Liability coverage to protect hardworking committee men and women and the player accident program operated in its fifth year under Marsh Insurance Brokers.
- The web portal - which allows each Member State and Territory Squash Association a place on the web through an efficient, integrated and supported platform.
- Squash Matrix - the national results and ranking system for the sport, continues to evolve in a cost effective way. Its modernisation, then continued development to be 'smart device' capable with expanded functionality under Squash Australia's control, puts the sport in a positive position as the anticipated participant registration interface looks set for a 2014 rollout.

The *Australian Squash Tour* continued to grow over 2013, with the combined efforts of the host Centres, State & Territory Associations and Performance Pathway staff. It remains the cornerstone of the sport's Elite Junior Development initiatives with Australia's aspiring players having the opportunity to earn World Tour ranking points 'at home'. With a significant number of quality international players coming 'downunder' to test our local talent, this ensures a challenging competitive environment for our Australian players and a 'hook' to gain local media attention.

The work of the members and Squash Australia over 2013 to implement the *Australian Junior Squash Tour* by aggregating the large number of junior squash events held across the country into a four tier classification system (Bronze, Silver, Gold & Platinum) proved a great success with over 70 events conducted and 1,000 individual athletes competing in the AJST's first year. 2014 is set to grow with 90 plus events registered. The key to the AJST and Australian Squash's future is through Clubs and Centres offering local events which are categorised at the Bronze level and building from there.

Also in the junior competition area was the conduct of the 2nd Australian Junior Open, which exploded from year one 140 entrants to 211 young players vying for the David Palmer and Sarah Fitz-Gerald trophies at NSW Squash headquarters – Thornleigh Squash Centre. This was followed later in the year by the Australian Junior Championships in Canberra at Squash ACTs Woden Centre with 222 athletes competing in the individuals followed by the keenly contested Australian Junior Teams Championships.

The *OzSquash* program which introduces primary school age children to Squash continued to evolve with momentum building for delivery through the Australian Sports Commissions Active After School program.

The 'Performance Pathway' - an integrated and coordinated approach to the oversight of Australia's National Teams and Squads was particularly active through 2013, not only in the context of Australia's participation in the World Games in Columbia, Men's World Teams Championships in France, Junior Women's World Championships in Poland and the conduct of the Girls & Boys Talent Squads, but also in terms of building towards the 2014 Glasgow Commonwealth Games particularly focussed on Doubles Squash. Australian Teams competing in Scotland, England and Darwin.

I mentioned earlier that the Australia's Winning Edge was to be implemented. This substantial system change to Australian Sport lead to all Australian Institute of Sport programs being closed and so the AIS Squash Unit having been based in Brisbane from the 80s concluded.

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The mechanisms which support Australia's athletes will undergo a significant change and Squash will be no different as 2014 rolls out.

The Australian Open had been a familiar event over the last three years in Canberra, it was however on a challenging financial footing, with losses that were unsustainable and so was not held in 2013. The sport must progress to find the partnerships to allow a feature top level Australian event to be held.

Aside from the substantial changes driven by Australia's Winning Edge, the somewhat infamous 'Blackest Day in Australian Sport' was another significant headline for Australian sport and so sport integrity became a key concern in Australian Sport. Whether it is Gambling, Doping or Child Protection the headlines have not read well and all involved in sport whether through administration, officiating, coaching or playing have a calling to be vigilant to protect those who play and the sport itself.

Behind the scenes work for a sporting organisation is extensive, with a wide range of responsibilities to be covered from regulatory aspects including corporation law, community (e.g. child protection), ethics (e.g. anti-doping) to expectations of the sport's members and participants including education programs, communication, calendar development, membership and participation in international affairs. I extend my thanks and acknowledge the contribution of many fantastic volunteers across a range of committees, tournaments and participation programs that support the sport and delivered these outcomes while to fellow Squash Australia staff I acknowledge your dedicated work.

To Squash Australia's partners including the Australian Sports Commission, Australian Institute of Sport, the Australian Commonwealth Games Association, your financial and organisational commitment to Squash is invaluable and greatly appreciated.

Board and Director Activity

Amendments to the Squash Australia Articles as recommended by the Governance Review report and approved by the members in August 2013 led to the abolishing of the President, Vice President - Female and Vice President - Male positions being elected at the AGM, with instead the Board electing its President and determining what positions it may so chose to operate with and who from their number to fill those positions. John Lee was so elected as President in August 2013 and Marcus Smith Vice President in October 2013.

The Squash Australia Board met on twelve occasions through 2013, with seven teleconferences and five 'face to face' meetings.

Directors attend to representational requirements in accord with their role, the record of attendance is provided in the

table below. Additionally, Directors have also attended meetings with service providers, Member Associations and Squash Australia advisory committees.

National Development Manager Report



2013 has allowed Squash Australia to continue to increase its focus on supporting, facilitating, and growing community based squash programs within Australia by demonstrating a cohesive approach with all members in the area of participation. The key projects were; the Australian Junior

Squash Tour (AJST), the OzSquash program and the development of the new Coach Development Framework. It is pleasing to report growth in participation for the sport, while highlighting the need that further change is required but as a sport we are moving in the right direction.

OzSquash

The OzSquash program has made significant in-roads in the area of Active After-School Communities and will continue to grow through the in-school and in-centre areas as the program continues to develop. The Active After-School Communities program is continuing to provide sporting opportunities for primary school children across Australia. During the 2013 Financial Year, the AASC program invested approximately \$20m in grassroots sport with an estimated \$20,000 of that being allocated to squash programs. For the same reporting period, the AASC delivered 28,000 programs and engaged approximately 760,000 participants.

With the importance of participation being pushed further up the sporting agenda, the AASC program is working closely with sporting organisations such as Squash

Australia to identify opportunities that will attract children to sport and provide a platform for their ongoing participation in sport.

The data provided depicts the overarching, national squash performance data and offers a comparison against the previous reporting period. Three performance areas have been selected:

1. Number of programs – a breakdown of the total number of AASC squash programs conducted in Australia;
2. Number of participants – a breakdown of the total number of participants who took part in AASC squash programs;
3. Number of coaches – a breakdown of the total number of coaches who delivered AASC squash programs, identified by coach category.

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The total number reflects a 76% growth on the previous reporting period. In percentage terms, this was a very strong performance for NSW, VIC & QLD but a noticeable decline in both SA and WA.

Participant results exceed the performance of the total program data and also provide a clear reflection of the impact the AASC has on the actual volume of participants with an increase of approximately 1,100 extra children exposed to the sport.

The total number reflects a 46% growth on the previous reporting period. Of concern is the growth in the number of private providers delivering squash – this result is contrary to the AASC's goal to engage with sporting organisations and encourage squash coaches to deliver AASC programs, thus enabling a greater opportunity for participant transition into the sport.

Squash Australia looks forward to engaging with AASC in the future as we align our participation objectives and begin to deliver shared sporting outcomes.

Australian Junior Squash Tour (AJST)

The AJST has been very successful in 2013, with some 67 tournaments being sanctioned and recognized, highlighting the abilities for States and Territories to work together in the administration of the sport. The benefits of the Australian Junior Squash Tour (AJST) have been:

- Participation – Increasing recognition of participation through sanctioned tournaments

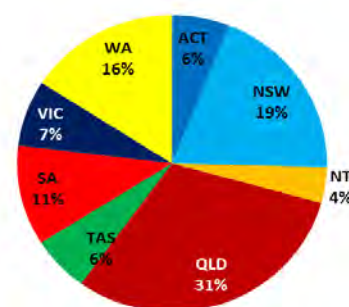
- Establishment of determinable and measurable KPIs against the sports' strategic plan

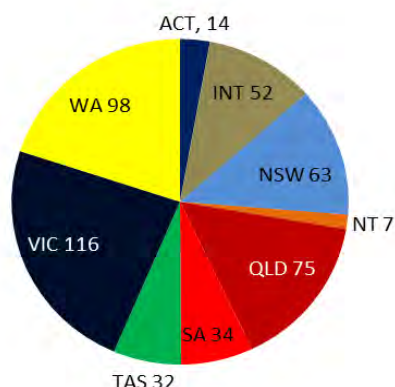

Current coach numbers for Squash Australia continues to grow and remain strong, increasing from 455 at the end of 2012 to 491 at the end of 2013.

Once again I look forward to 2014 being extremely active, with the continued development of the OzSquash

program, the Australian Junior Squash Tour, the inclusion of the Oceania Junior Championships and the implementation of the New Coach Development Framework (submitted to the ASC in December 2013).

SDC (Squash Development Council)

The SDC met on ten occasions in 2013, either by teleconference or in a face to face delivery. The role of SDC under Terms of Reference is to:

- Work under the direction of the Squash Australia Board and provide information and advice to Squash Australia and Member State/Territory Board Members on national issues which are relevant to Sport Development Division (Participation, Coaching, Competitions, Facilities and Referees).
- Share information, resources and best practice learning.
- Foster teamwork and consensus on matters affecting the development of the sport in Australia.
- Contribute to the development, implementation, monitoring and review of national strategies and programs to:
 - Ensure they deliver outcomes that contribute to the achievement of outcomes contained in the National and Member State/Territory Strategic Plans relevant to the Sport Development Division.
 - Manage risk and ensure implementation does not negatively impact or have any unforeseen outcomes on Squash Australia or any Member State/Territory.
- Provide input into Squash Australia decision-making.
- Be role models for Squash Australia, Member State/Territory Associations and Club staff and volunteers.
- Be active advocates for the sport.
- Provide open and honest feedback to members and staff for the betterment of the sport.

National Refereeing Manager Report



Refereeing commitments in 2013 remained significant, despite the absence of the Australian and ACT Opens, with referees provided to National events and the Australian Squash Tour, including the State Opens. A number of other programs were initiated, continued or supported. Australian Refereeing programs continue to meet world's best practice, at least matching and, in most regions, exceeding achievement elsewhere.

The State and Territory support to refereeing was good. Almost all refereeing costs for State Opens were funded, including bringing in referees from elsewhere where local numbers were short. Many States also took the longer term view, and used visiting referees to run player and referee training courses. More is needed achieve refereeing self-sufficiency in all states and National Refereeing will continue to support these programs.

A new initiative was started in 2013 with initial rollout of a Junior Referee Development Program. The Program has 2 objectives: initially, it provides juniors with skills needed to mark or referee at local, state and national events; but more importantly, by providing juniors with the necessary skills, it aims to provide them with a more positive experience of refereeing as a first step to changing to a better culture for refereeing in the longer term. It is designed to engage juniors and to do so makes extensive use of our latest video clips of appropriate standard in PowerPoint presentations.

Tournaments were well used by referees to maintain or upgrade their accreditation levels. Sixteen International, National and AST events were covered with 16 referees provided with 51 assignments. Referees were mainly National level or above with opportunities also found for State referees with potential for advancement to National level. National Referee numbers remained constant with one new appointment and one retirement. Oceania Regional numbers reduced with one retirement.

Refereeing involvement with the ASC remains significant. Attendance at workshops has confirmed

that Refereeing continues to meet updated ASC requirements for NOAS registration and workforce development.

With the Rules changing on 1st January 2014, work is already underway on updating resources, including printing new rule books, and for WSF wall charts and an abbreviated version of the Rules. Updated Rules exams are being produced for Australia and WSF and the Club level exam is expected to be available online in early 2014. A workshop for referees is also preparation to ensure all referees maintain their accreditation under the new Rules.

Our contribution to WSF Refereeing has continued to be significant in 2013. Chris Sinclair, Damien Green and Nathan Turnbull all had WSF overseas appointments during the year. Chris Sinclair remains on the WSF Referees' Committee and Rules Committee and is a WSF Senior Assessor. Chris and Damien are WSF Assessors and part of the WSF Referee Appointments process. John Small and Chris continue to provide advice on the ongoing development of WSF Refereeing, including CBTA standards for assessors and referees at all levels. For the Oceania Federation, Chris Sinclair continues as Refereeing Convenor and John Small is on the Refereeing Committee. Both continue to develop better standards for Oceania referees at all levels.

Refereeing priorities for 2014 are expected to include: assistance for WSF, Regional and National referees and assessors; assistance for State referees to achieve National accreditation; running the National Refereeing Workshop for professional development of referees, assessors and tournament referees; further rollout of the Junior Referee Program; and encouraging and supporting State Associations to improve their local refereeing.

I wish to thank Chris Sinclair and Damien Green for their work on the Rules & Refereeing Committee, as well as those who committed voluntary time during the year. Good support has again been provided from the top by CEO Gary O'Donnell and Ryan Wiegand in the Squash Australia office.

Media Liaison Officer Report



I've been in the role of Squash Australia Media Liaison Officer since late 2013.

Previous officer reports have spoken of the difficulties of attracting media attention, and not much has changed.

However the increasing role of social and online media continues to provide opportunities for squash, and appears to be the most favoured form of media consumption by most of our players especially.

Traditional media, such as newspapers and television, are still important outlets but increasingly focused on bigger sports like football, cricket and tennis.

The traditional outlets are also downsizing their sport departments, leaving their remaining writers to focus on the big sports and offloading responsibility for 'other' sports to AAP.

The lack of a big ticket squash event in the last few months has made it difficult to attract big media coverage. We received good local coverage late 2013, especially around the hat-trick of Queensland victories for Lisa Camilleri.

Looking to the future, we must focus on the Commonwealth Games and try and maximise our media coverage. We will have limited opportunities, given nearly all our top players are based overseas, so every effort

must be made to make these players accessible to the media.

We have several strong hooks – defending gold medallists, players possibly playing in their final games. We may also focus on some of the more turbulent times for one or two of our players, highlighting how we are now all fighting for the one cause – the advancement of squash!

In the coming months we will also ramp up our social media campaign. My plan is to maybe get some of the top players blogging regularly on their preparations, introduce some more video content and provide opportunities for more interaction with fans and followers.

Facebook and Twitter are still the flavour of the month, so it's time for Squash Australia to get on the front foot and use these avenues to our advantage.

Regular updates, fun postings along with the serious stuff, accurate and timely reports on our players' performances will help bring people to our pages.

The more we get people talking about squash, the harder it is for the media and the public to ignore.

Performance Pathway Manager Report



The Performance Pathway incorporates all aspects of the player pathway which leads to the selection of Australia's Squash Teams for the Commonwealth Games and World Teams Championships.

After five years of operation, the Performance Pathway strives to build strong foundations to enhance the performance of our athletes and coaches.

In 2013 at the top of the Pathway we saw a solid performance from our Men's Team at the WSF Men's Team World Championships in France. Our Junior Women also competed in Poland at the WSF World Junior Women's Team Championship.

The Performance Pathway underwent some restructuring early in the year with the two part time National Development Coaches concluding their positions and a single National Talent Development Coach fulltime position created. The successful candidate being Rodney Eyles.

The staffing restructure facilitated changes to the operation of the National Talent Squads and Underpinning programs for the future.

As the year evolved the Australian sports system imposed substantial change on sports particularly those with AIS programs. The AIS/Squash Australia program was impacted with the AIS decision to no longer deliver High Performance programs directly leading to the closure of the AIS Squash program at the end of 2013.

The Australian Squash Tour has continued to grow and expand. As each year passes the Tour gets stronger with more events and higher skilled players from many countries coming to Australia to play. This will only benefit our players.

2014 Commonwealth Games preparations continued throughout the year as the Shadow Squad was increased to sixteen members. Activities included a Doubles Event in Scotland and a very successful event in Darwin that was supported by the NT Government. A third event is planned for Manchester in December 2013.

The Pathway continues to place a high emphasis on analysing and developing both athletes and coaches technical squash skills. As we continue to expand so do the opportunities to develop our coaches, players, officials and support staff. The changes that are occurring in the sport will only enhance the development of all areas of Squash in Australia.

Australian Institute of Sport



The Australian Institute of Sport – Squash Program and Squash Australia became more closely aligned with the responsibility of the program falling fully under Squash Australia's control. This is a change that has been mandated by the Australian Sports Commission and the Australia Institute of Sport. The structure and how programs are funded have also changed. These changes are a direct result of Australia's Winning Edge.

There were some key contributions to the Performance Pathway by the AIS this past year. I would like to recognise the work of AIS/Squash Australia Head Coach, Byron Davis and our National Talent Development Coaches Rod Eyles and Vicki Cardwell as well as Sarah Fitz-Gerald for their work with our athletes.

Australian Squash Tour



The Australian Squash Tour has continued to grow and develop. The goal of the Australian Tour is to underpin our senior pathway by providing high level competitive opportunities in Australia by hosting events from each of the Women's (WSA) and Men's (PSA) Tours. This will allow our developing athletes the opportunity to enhance their skills and abilities and importantly gather World Tour points 'at home'.

The 2013 Australian Tour had significant increases in International players coming to Australia to compete. The largest increase has been in the women's tour.

In the WSA while there were two less events in 2013 than in the previous year, more players participated. The increase was driven by 53 more players over the 2012 tour coming from outside Australia. This increase was partly due to a reduction of events on the WSA Tour and so players travelled to Australia to obtain competition. This presents a great opportunity for our younger players to train and play more overseas competitors.

The PSA side of the Tour has been very consistent with almost every event reaching capacity. Like the WSA, there were two less events this year but only five fewer participants. Just over 50% of the players coming from overseas.

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The priority remains to assist our players in developing and playing in PSA and WSA Tournaments domestically before having to leave Australia to compete overseas in higher World Tour point value events.

A summary of participants on the Tour is;

2013

- 32 Countries were represented – 453 International - 484 Australian participants = 937 Total participants

2012

- 32 Countries were represented - 322 Internationals - 620 Australian players = 1041 Total participants

A couple of Australian highlights from 2013 were the performances of Mike Corren who won four events taking his career total to 47 Tour wins. Lisa Camilleri came back from injury this year to finish 2013 with three straight wins.

In 2013 Australians have won 39% of the Australian WSA Tour events and 57% of the Australian PSA Tour events. A complete listing of the winners and the results can be found on the website.

World Men's Team Championships



Australia competed in Mulhouse, France in June 2013 at the WSF Men's World Team Championship 2013.

The team claimed fourth place at the championship - this was a great result for the men.

National Junior Talent Squads

Our National Talent Squad (NTS) programs have benefited from the expertise and experience of our National Talent Development Coaches, Rod Eyles and Vicki Cardwell.

Earlier in 2013 the structure of the NTS program began to change. Rod Eyles was appointed as the National Talent Development Coach. Rod worked with Vicki Cardwell and now is working with the Underpinning programs with Byron Davis our National Head Coach.

The NTS will now focus on giving our younger athletes more opportunity to represent Australia at a younger age. We are now focussing on Under age groups starting with U13, U15, U17, U19 and U21.

The NTS program will engage in our partner nations playing in their events as well as competing in Test Matches. January will see the resurrection of the Trans-Tasman Test Match between Australia and New Zealand. The Test Match will precede the Oceania Junior Championship on the Gold Coast.

During 2013 leading up to the changes the only NTS in operation was the 2013 Girls Squad. The squad was led by Vicki Cardwell with assistance from Robin Cooper (QLD).

AIS Squash Program Report



AIS/Squash Australia athletes achieved excellent results in 2013 with the highlights consisting of Cameron Pilley, Ryan Cuskelly, Matthew Karwalski and David Palmer finished 4th at the World Men's Teams Championships in France. Australia was very close to defeating number 1

seeds Egypt in the semi-finals in a fantastic exhibition of squash, and ultimately finished 4th after losing to host nation France in the 3rd-4th play-off.

Cameron Pilley was a quarterfinalist in the British Open while Lisa Camilleri won 4 WSA World tour events in 2013 on the comeback from an 18 month injury lay-off. Australia's leading female player, Kasey Brown, made the final of the prestigious Tournament of Champions while also a quarter finalist at the British Open. A number of athletes achieved career best rankings in 2013 which bodes well for a strong performance next year at the Commonwealth Games in Glasgow.

2013 sees the conclusion of the AIS Squash Program after 28 years with the Australian Institute of Sport decision not to operate sport programs from 2013 onwards. This is part of 'The Winning Edge' strategy announced by the AIS and Australian Sports Commission in November 2012. Essentially the strategy outlines that sport runs sport, which in effect means that all National Sporting Organisations are responsible for delivering high performance outcomes for the sport as opposed to the AIS.

Squash Australia will therefore be responsible for delivering all high performance programs throughout the national performance pathway. A new Squash Australia high performance program will be implemented in 2014 to ensure that Australia's leading athletes are provided with the necessary support to achieve Squash Australia's Winning Edge targets.

There have been many people that have contributed to the success of the AIS Squash program both on and off the court. First and foremost, Geoff Hunt was the Head Coach for over 20 years and oversaw a golden era of Australian Squash. Geoff was ably assisted by squash legends Heather McKay and Ken Hiscoe in the early years whereby Australia achieved outstanding international success winning world individual and team championships. Rodney Martin joined Geoff Hunt in the mid 1990's and the program continued to flourish with outstanding international results. More recently coaches such as Anthony Ricketts, Rodney Eyles, Sarah Fitz-Gerald, Michelle Martin and Vicki Cardwell have worked closely with Australia's leading athletes to achieve excellent results at benchmark events.

The list of athletes that have been on AIS scholarships over the past 28 years is very long but has included most of the great names of Australian Squash over this period. From individual world champions such as Rodney Eyles, Michelle Martin, Rodney Martin, David Palmer, Rachael Grinham, Carol Owens and Sarah Fitz-Gerald through to numerous athletes winning Commonwealth Games medals and World Team Championships, the successes have been many and varied.

The AIS/Squash Australia program maintained its service team staff in 2013. Luke Stafford (ACE), Jason Patchell (Psychology), Lauren Nugent (Nutrition), Shane Lemcke (Physiotherapist), and Dr Andrew Smith (Medicine) continued in their support roles and provided outstanding service.

With the closure of the AIS program it is appropriate to acknowledge all of the service providers over the past 28 years that have provided world class training, treatment and advice to Australia's leading players. Without the support of the support team many athletes would have had shorter careers and would not have realised their potential. Therefore on behalf of Squash Australia and the AIS, I would like to thank all of those people that have contributed to the program's success over this period.

World Class Athletes

Males

Cameron Pilley WR 14

Cameron has performed well in 2013 both individually and from a team perspective. Cameron was a quarter-finalist in the British Open upsetting current world number 4 Mohammad El Shorbagy 3/2 in the 2nd round and losing an epic 3/2 match against former World Number 1 James Willstrop in the quarter-finals. Cameron also led the Australian Senior Men's Team to a 4th place finish at the World Men's Team Championships in France. Cameron recorded a number of impressive wins along the way including his first win over former world number 1 Karim Darwish in the semi-finals against Egypt.

Ryan Cuskelly WR 33

Ryan had a solid year with highlights including a semi-final in the New York Metro Open and a quarter-final in the Colombian Open. Ryan was also a member of the Australian Team at the World Men's Team Championships in France that finished 4th.

Mathew Karwalski WR 49

Matthew has broken into the top 50 in the world rankings for the first time in his career with highlights including reaching the 2nd round in the World Open and winning the Resistencia Open in Argentina. Matthew was also a member of the Australian Team at the World Men's Team Championships in France that finished 4th.

Steve Finitis WR 55

Steve improved his ranking by 18 spots in 2013. This was on the back of some excellent performances which included winning the Tasmanian Open and runner up

finishes at the Victorian Open and the Buler Challenge in Hong Kong.

Rex Hedrick WR 66

Rex recorded his biggest win on the PSA tour in 2013 when he won the Phoenix Open. Rex also won two more events in 2013 the Northern Territory Open and the Alice Springs Open.

Zac Alexander WR 69

Zac played in a limited number of events due to a hip problem that saw him undergo surgery in September at the AIS in Brisbane. It is anticipated that Zac will return to the men's tour in early 2014.

Mike Corren WR 85

Mike won 4 PSA tour events in 2013 including the City of Perth, Barossa, North Coast and South Australian Open's. This meant that Mike has won 47 PSA tour titles over his career, a fantastic achievement.

Females

Kasey Brown WR 11

Kasey has had a successful 2013 with excellent results on the WSA Tour. Kasey started 2013 off by reaching the final of the Tournament of Champions at Grand Central Station in New York. Kasey then went on to reach the quarter-finals of the Texas, British and US Open's.

Rachael Grinham WR 14

Rachael's highlights for 2013 included reaching the semi-finals at the Tournament of Champions and the final of the Macau Open in China. Rachael also won the Victorian Open in July which was her 32nd WSA tour title.

Donna Urquhart WR 22

Donna has had an injury interrupted season in 2013 with foot surgery required after her first few events early in the year. Donna made the second round of the US Open in October.

Lisa Camilleri WR 43

Lisa has made a very strong comeback from her injury issues in 2013. Lisa commenced the year with a finals berth at the Australia Day Challenge in Brisbane and followed that up by reaching the final at the South Australian Open. Lisa went on to win three events at the end of 2013 which included the Queensland, Caboolture and Mackay Open's.

Melody Francis WR 50

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Melody started 2013 off strongly winning the Australia Day Challenge in Brisbane. Melody then went on to make the final of the South Australian Open.

Sarah Cardwell WR 56

Sarah made the final of the New South Wales Open in August and then qualified for one of the world's most prestigious tournaments, the US Open, before losing to Low Wee Wern in the first round.

International Class Athletes

Tamika Saxby WR 64

Tamika had a consistent 2013 where she recorded numerous semi-final performances at events such as the Alice Spring, North Coast, Queensland, Caboolture and Mackay Opens.

Christine Nunn WR 68

Christine had a breakthrough performance at the North Coast Open where she made her first WSA tour final before losing to Siyoli Waters 3/1. Christine also recorded semi-final appearances at the Australia Day Challenge in Brisbane and the City of Perth WSA events.

Jessica Turnbull WR 87

Jessica had a successful 2013 winning the Australian Junior Open and Australian Junior Championship in the Under 19 age group. Jessica also competed actively on the WSA tour, improving her world ranking from 102 to 87 over the course of the year.

Visiting Athletes

Rhys Dowling WR 195

Rhys won the Australian Junior Championships Under 19 age group and was a finalist at the Australian Junior Open in 2013. Rhys also participated on the Australian Squash Tour with his best performance a quarter-final place at the North Coast Open. Rhys started the year ranked 235 and finished at 195.

Tom Calvert WR 220

Tom came into the program in the middle of the year after solid performances on the Australian Squash Tour which saw his ranking improve from 270 at the start of the year into 220. Tom was also a finalist in the Australian Junior Championships Under 19 age group.

Summary

I would like to acknowledge the ongoing support that we have received from the Australian Institute of Sport and Australian Sports Commission. The AIS has been a world leader in the development of world class athletes since its inception and the knowledge gained by the players has had a positive impact on the Squash program.

The University of Queensland and in particular UQ Sport have also been great supporters of the program, providing a quality daily training environment for the players.

The program would like to thank AIS Consultant Coach and National Women's Coach Sarah Fitz-Gerald, National Senior Men's Coach Rodney Eyles and Gordon Young AIS Administrator for their contributions throughout 2013. WSF World Men's Team Championship Report



The following report details the Australian Team Performance at the World Men's Team Championships in Mulhouse, France 2013.

Team Event

The 24th World Men's Teams Championships (9th - 15th June 2013) was held in Mulhouse, France. The event was made up of 31 teams. The Australian team consisted of Cameron Pilley, David Palmer, Ryan Cuskelly and Matthew Karwalski. The Australian team was seeded fourth for the championships - behind Egypt, England, and France respectively.

Pool Matches

Round 1 - Switzerland - Order of Play 1,2,3

The opening pool match saw Australia against Switzerland. Cameron Pilley played Nicholas Mueller which was always going to be a tough game but Pilley started well winning 11/6. Mueller seemed a little tense, trying too hard. In the second game Mueller came back with a run of consistent plays midway through the game and took out a close 2nd game winning 8/11. Cameron showed signs of brilliance in the 3rd and stuck to the game plan by closing out Mueller 11/3. Mueller gave one last ditch in the 4th, who seemed always behind in the game, but Pilley prevailed 11/9 with a great opening match win for Australia.

David Palmer shook off the cobwebs in the first game against Reiko Peter and got through in a close 11/9 game but seemed comfortable all the same. A steady 11/7 win in the 2nd showed David starting to find his groove and in the 3rd game walked over his opponent with a 11/3 win.

The opening match for Ryan Cuskelly at the World Championships was against Jonas Daehler. Ryan showed signs of nervous energy before he played but whilst on court, he stuck to the game plan and opened his account up with an 11/7, 11/7 and a commanding 11/4 3rd game.

This gave Australia a 3/0 win in the first pool match which was just the confident start we were looking for.

Round 2 - Mexico - Order of Play 2,3,1

David Palmer played Cesar Salazar (quite a dangerous player). This was always going to be a great test for David as the pace of the match would be played at a high level. It was a tough 1st game, with David expending quite a bit of energy to squeeze out the 1st 11/7. As this was David's first hard hit out for a while, he found himself behind the eight ball in the 2nd by still trying to play the same pace as the first. This is a whole new head space for David and coming back from retirement had just

become a reality. The same again happened in the 3rd game with the spirited Salazar closing out 11/7. This is where David came into his element and slowed the pace down. He played some well thought out, strategic rallies to win convincing 11/3 in the 4th. David started well in the 5th by varying his pace and showed signs of his class to close out the match 11/5.

A spirited Eric Galvez potentially may have posted concerns for Ryan Cuskelly but Ryan simply outclassed and outpaced Galvez in a commanding, well concentrated performance. Ryan showing some very good signs of listening to the game plans and executing them well. Cuskelly won 3/0

Cameron Pilley outclassed Arturo Salazar 3/0. The scores were comfortable all the way through.

Round of 16 - Pakistan - Order of Play 1,3,2

Having reached the round of 16, after some convincing wins in the pool matches, Team Australia were up against a young but potentially dangerous Pakistani side. Cameron Pilley was up against Nasir Iqbal. It was important for Cameron to start well for Australia and he didn't disappoint. He dominated in the first 2 games by outpacing and outclassing Iqbal. Perhaps a lapse in concentration by Pilley and a display of class shots enabled Iqbal to win the 3rd but Pilley came back in the 4th with some consistent, structured rallies to win the match. This gave Australia the start we needed to dampen the spirits of the young Pakistanis.

Ryan Cuskelly against Farham Mehboob was very impressive throughout the 3/0 win. A touch of understandable nervousness in the first game was present but still managed to win 11/9. Ryan found a good rhythm and stuck to the game plan going on to win in a strong commanding performance. This was a brilliant result for Australia and other teams started to feel our presence.

David Palmer went on to play the dead rubber against Farhan Zaman and completed the impressive dominance of the Australian side. This was a great performance by Team Australia with all players coming through relatively fresh for the upcoming quarter finals.

Quarter Finals - Germany - Order of Play 2,1,3,

Australia came up against a confident German side in the Quarter Finals. This was, however, unfamiliar territory for the Germans as it was their first time through to the quarters in some time. Australia's experience shone through.

David Palmer versed a young and confident Raphael Kandra in the first tie. David's experience really came through here as the German wasn't going to give up

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without a fight. He took a commanding 2/0 lead and in a marathon 3rd game, David secured the rubber.

It was a very classy performance by Cameron Pilley to defeat his equally world ranked opponent Simon Rosner in the all important 2nd rubber. Pilley's confidence was high and never gave the German a look in from the first game. Pilley is now gaining a reputation for starting well and certainly delivered in this performance. Rosner tried everything in the 2nd game but Pilley managed to squeeze an all important 14/12 win to take the 2/0 lead. Rosner in the 3rd just looked lost and defeated as Pilley displayed an array of attacking shots and length to close a convincing 3rd game 11/5 and the win for Team Australia to now reach the Semi Finals.

Team Australia decided to rest Ryan Cuskelly in the dead rubber.

Semi Finals - Egypt - Order of Play 1,2,3

The Semi Finals saw Australia up against the number 1 seed, Egypt. This was a must win for the Egyptians as leaving out Ramy Ashour may have been catastrophic. Australia's performances in the tournament thus far gave them the best opportunity to challenge the current World Champions.

Cameron Pilley gave a brilliant display to defeat the former World Number 1, Karim Darwish, in a marathon 4 games. This is the first time in Pilley's career he has defeated Darwish and he truly picked his moment to shine. With a score line of 12/10, 14/16, 12/10, 11/9, this match was truly epic and will go down as one of the most outstanding performances by an Australian.

David Palmer was up against Omar Mosaad in the second rubber. A difficult and at times awkward Mosaad, seemed to rattle Palmer. Mosaad's style never let Palmer get into a comfortable rhythm. Palmer set the match up brilliantly by winning the first game 13/11. A determined Mosaad came back at Palmer in the second with some strong physical rallies which seemed to be weighing on the Australian. At one game all, the stage was set for both players to win the all important third game. Palmer lost this game 6/11 to a now confident Mosaad. Palmer gave his all in the fourth but unfortunately Mosaad got over the line 11/9 to take the rubber and draw the match at one all.

Ryan Cuskelly played Tarek Momen in the third and final rubber and this did not disappoint. Cuskelly got off to a brilliant start with a commanding 11/3 first game win. The second saw a display of brilliance by Momen who had now seemingly got rid of his nerves and completely turned the momentum around to his favour. You simply had to applaud the somewhat risky but skillful play by Momen to take both the second and third games 6/11, 5/11. Once again, Cuskelly displayed true grit and determination and miraculously won the fourth 11/7. He wasn't going to leave any stone unturned. The 11/5 final

game score line did not indicate how close Australia were to taking down the World Champions. Cuskelly was clearly depleted but his commitment to Australia cannot be doubted.

It truly was a proud day to be an Australian.

3rd/4th Playoff - France - Order of Play 3,1,2

Patrick Hermann's assistance was well needed for Australia in the lead up to the 3rd/4th playoff against France. After the disappointment of losing to Egypt the day before, Australia were clearly up for the challenge for the bronze medal.

Once again, Ryan Cuskelly started brilliantly by claiming a tough first game 11/8 against Mathieu Castagnet. A mirror image of the second saw Castagnet turn the tie into 1 game all. A deafening French home side crowd pumped up the now confident Castagnet to give him a 2/1 lead. Cuskelly then dug deep once again and pulled out a seemingly physically impossible match leveler to win 11/9. Now into the 5th, early on Cuskelly was noticeably cramping but wouldn't lie down. Eventually Castagnet won 11/6 in the 5th to a rapturous French stadium.

Cameron Pilley then went on to try and square the ledger against Gregory Gaultier. A tough but close first game saw Gaultier squeeze a 11/9 win. Now the confidence of Gaultier was on full display. He looked stronger as the match progressed and a battle weary Pilley could not contain him eventually losing the 2nd and 3rd 11/4, 11/4.

Australia lost the playoff 2/0 and came in 4th position overall at the World Mens Championships.

Summary

It was a pleasure to be a part of a very proud Australian Team. From the moment they were presented with their Australian Team Uniforms they got the message straight away about what we were there to do.

I think the Team "punched" way above their weight and played some memorable matches that will go down in our Australian Team History.

I have already used this Team as an inspirational speech to our Under 19 Junior Women's side and will proudly reference this Team as one of the great performances at a World Championship.

Finally, we would like to thank Gary O'Donnell, Gordon Young and the staff of Squash Australia for all their assistance in the organisation and preparation of the team.

The 2013 World Junior Championships were held in Wrocław, Poland in a brand new

22 court facility. Following a pre-camp on the Gold Coast, the team commenced their journey and arrived in time to acclimatise and practice prior to the start of the event.

The Individual Event commenced with Nicole Stoneham and Natalie Newton both having wins in Round 1. (Natalie Newton def Klaudia Borek (Poland) 3/0 - 11/2, 11/2, 11/2; Nicole Stoneham def Dominika Kejkova (Czech) 3/0 - 11/6, 11/2, 11/6). Grace McErvalle and Jessica Turnbull both received byes.

Round 2 unfortunately saw Natalie, Nicole and Grace all finish their World Junior campaign (Sachika Ingale (India) def Grace McErvalle 3/0 - 11/8, 11/6, 11/5; Sabrina Sobhy (USA) def Natalie Newton 3/0 - 11/4, 11/6, 11/5; Yathreb Adel (Egypt) def Nicole Stoneham 3/0 - 11/2, 11/2, 11/5) Jessica Turnbull won her opening match against Kayley Leonard (USA) 3/1 - 5/11, 11/9, 13/11, 11/5.

Unfortunately Jessica was unable to defeat Rebecca Barnett from New Zealand in Round 3 (last 32) losing 3/0.

Whilst the girls were disappointed in their results, they definitely learnt a lot and were exposed to the standard of players around the world. They continued to practice well and get themselves ready for the Teams Event.

The Teams Event followed with Australia placed in a pool with Poland, Egypt and New Zealand. The opening match saw Australia up against Egypt. This was always going to be a tough challenge but an opportunity to get on court with the best juniors in the world.

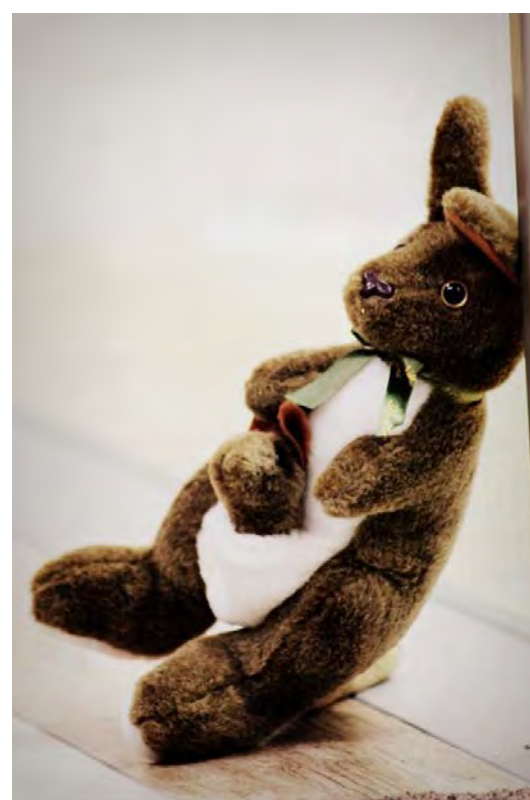

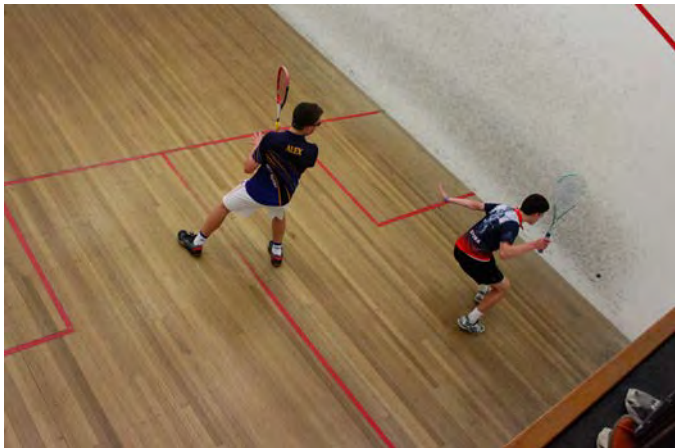

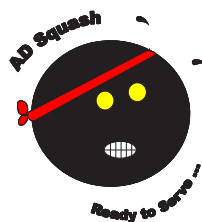

Squash ACT Report



2013 marked a turning point for ACT Squash. In writing this report it needs to be noted that I have only been President since July and as such this report will document the things that Squash ACT has achieved since then.

- Hosted the Australian Masters and Masters Trans-Tasman tests
- Hosted the Australian Junior Championships
- ACT's Peter Nuttall won the Boys U13 section of the AJC & maintain the No.1 ranking for the majority 2013
- As part of the Centenary of Canberra we held the Festival of Squash
- The Vikings club won the Centenary of Canberra club award for the holding of their yellow day. This was a great initiative

Competition:

In 2013 we saw a slight reduction in pennant player numbers however this is due to pick up in 2014 with significant work being put in to growing the competition by all clubs.

The junior competition remained stable with 68 players participating in the 2013 Spring Junior Pennant and we expect a similar numbers for 2014. With Sam working with schools to build the school's squash program we hope to increase this number over the next 12 months.

Growing the sport:

One of the major priorities of Squash ACT in late 2013 was to put in place a three year strategic plan and seek

assistance to modernize our facilities. In November 2013 two grants were submitted. The first was for annual funding and another for maintenance funds to upgrade the ACT Squash owned Woden Centre. Both grants have been successful. In addition funding has also been sourced to upgrade our Erindale Centre. More will be known on that in 2014.

Of the five centres in Canberra it is expected that all will be upgraded or have received a previous 'facelift' by mid 2014.

In growing the sport it is imperative that facilities are modern and meet the needs of the customer base. Further work will be completed in this area in 2014.

Overall squash in the ACT is starting to look up:

- numbers have plateaued and it is expected that these will begin to rise in 2014
- all centres will receive an upgrade by mid 2014
- the Woden Centre will receive much needed funding resulting in a modern facility for future events

I would like to personally thank the Board of Squash ACT for their help this year as well as Sam and Sean (before he departed).

I would also like to thank Gary Hampson for his time as President. He had the vision to at least see what a small Territory could achieve in taking on the Australian Open.

NSW Squash Report



The past 12 months has been a time of rebuilding for the NSW Squash. A new CEO was appointed and a new Manager at our Thornleigh Squash Centre was appointed. The legal matters have almost all been finalized due to a lot of long hours and hard work by our Legal Director, Chris Barnes.

Garry Somerville was appointed to the CEO role on a permanent part time basis and has settled into the role extremely well. Conducting the business of a sporting Association is not an easy job these days with many government regulations, both State and Federal, which have to be abided by. Sport is now big business and has to be run as such.

NSW Squash has paid all its outstanding debts and can now begin to pay back the overdraft. This has been no easy task but with careful planning and a lot of cost saving we have achieved an outcome sooner than we anticipated. To run a successful sporting business we have to run it as a business. We had no choice but to introduce better business practice. To achieve this we introduced a new method of collecting (Sydney) pennant fees. A general meeting was held to explain this to the clubs. Some dissension was voiced but on introduction, all clubs paid their team entry fee before the commencement of Round 1. This has saved the CEO many hours in sending out invoices and then following them up. Hopefully, they also have introduced better business practice and no longer have to chase players for their pennant fees.

We have 72 affiliated clubs from around NSW and while this is a little down on last year, quite a few centres/clubs have closed their doors for various reasons. However,

- Darwin International Doubles Tournament with three countries attending (Scotland, New Zealand and Australia) with their prospective Commonwealth Games athletes; and

 Squash SA remains dedicated to providing opportunities for people to be healthier, happier and connected to their community through sport. Together with our members and partners we support South Australians to participate in squash and racquetball through:

- beginner, school and junior club programs
- pennant and social in-house competitions
- tournaments
- high performance squads.

This year, the Board has focused work on four key platform areas, guided by the Squash SA vision, including:

- participation and membership
- improvement of facilities
- game and player development
- governance and administration.

It has been important, given the present economic climate, for the Board to put measures in place that reduce Squash SA's operating expenses and aim to pay down loan liabilities. Upon thorough analysis, operations have been restructured in a way that maintains service

levels and continues to effectively deliver the Squash SA Business Plan.

In addition, the Board has initiated an extensive study to investigate the financial, operational and management benefits and risks of our licensed venue Racquets SA. The study investigates options for asset diversification, presenting business cases that provide commercial growth and sustainable investment returns to the Association. The Board is currently working to finalise the report (to be released late in 2013), which will be integral to guide our future strategic priorities and directions.

Over the course of the year, we have been fortunate to collaborate with a number of partners, supporters and sponsors who are as committed to growing the sport as we are. Squash SA works with and supports operators and volunteer administrators from 41 affiliated member clubs. In partnership with Squash SA, Member Clubs play a vital role in building, growing, strengthening and improving our sport.

Squash Tasmania Report



2013 was another good year for squash in Tasmania. Our achievements for the year are briefly summarised under the

Key Result Areas identified in our Strategic Plan.

Participation

The Oz Squash Program was rolled out in Tasmania in 2013 resulting in new junior players enrolling in junior programs.

After school squash in centre coaching programs were provided in 12 Tasmanian squash centres. The number of in centre programs running is limited by the number of coaches available to run the programs. Achievement of our goal to have a coach available to run programs in each squash centre at least once per week is essential for participation to improve. We need to continue to focus on age groups 5 to over 70.

Dunlop Competition Ball and Karakal Big Ball junior tournaments were held at various venues around the state. Juniors participating in these events seem to be supercharged by playing juniors from other centres. Hopefully, this experience will encourage them to work harder at their squash and participate in Australian Squash Tour Tournaments and seek selection in the Squash Tasmania Performance Pathway Program.

Open and Master's pennant competitions and tournaments provide an incentive for these age groups to play more and to improve their standard of play.

For our seniors, Gentle Squash provides a great activity to improve their fitness and creates an opportunity for social interaction.

Facilities

Tasmania is very lucky to have most of our squash centres in public ownership, mostly local government. These courts are available to squash clubs and coaches at very reasonable rates. While most courts do not have heating and cooling systems, they are kept in good order by the local government authorities. It is up to our squash community to support these facilities through our use of the courts.

Development

Two Tasmanian referees were upgraded to State Level at the Tasmanian Open. We are looking forward to their assistance in referee development in Tasmania over the next few years.

The coaching accreditation system has been reviewed and we are looking forward to seeing the new system in place in 2014.

Performance Pathway

Squash Tasmania Performance Pathway documentation continues to be reviewed and improved. We are pleased with the program outcomes this year. However, we must remember that the athlete performance level in this program is dependent on the volume of players in our participation programs.

Tasmania was represented at national championships by junior and Masters' teams this year.

The 2013 Tasmanian Open was hosted by the Tasmanian Squash Academy at Eastside. Players from 18 countries participated and the event received excellent publicity in all forms of the media. It was a tremendous promotion for our sport. The prize money was made available by Squash Australia and the Tasmanian Squash Academy. We are still hoping to secure a major sponsor for future years.

Profile

In addition the Tasmanian Open, which is our highest profile event, the Squash-in-School and Totball programs were delivered during school time to 50 primary schools state wide. The promotion was delivered to over 8,000 Prep to Grade 6 children directly resulting in 70 new juniors joining squash clubs. The programs were funded from a Sport and Recreation Tasmania State Grant, sponsorship from the Tasmanian Squash Academy and an allocation from affiliation fees. Most clubs chose to take advantage of the program. Wynyard Club ran a number of promotional programs in addition to Totball and Squash-in-Schools.

strategic plan. The organisation has operated under two consecutive 12-month interim strategic plans and the Board sought to set some firm longer term strategic priorities. These priorities needed to reflect any change in culture of the organisation since 2011, as well as the national sporting context within which the sport operates. Squash Vic secured funding from the State Government to engage a facilitator and an extensive analysis and consultation process unfolded over a 6 month period. The final plan, to be officially launched in 2014, focusses on 6 key result areas designed to achieve the organisation's new vision of Engaged Players. Strong Clubs. Great Venues. World Class Events. A special mention to consultant Steve Whittington for his guidance and support during this important project.

Squash Vic completed the second year of its women and girls participation project funded by the Victorian Health Promotion Foundation's (VicHealth) State Sporting Association Participation Program. The learn to play program – Hits & Giggles – has now introduced over 375 new women into the sports of squash and racquetball with 17 clubs/venues around Victoria supporting the

program. South Australia has adopted the program and is running their own Hits & Giggles activities. Former Development Coordinator Tegan Doherty, brought a lot of enthusiasm and ideas to Hits & Giggles which saw additional skill level tiers (intermediate and advanced programs) introduced in 2013. Stage 3 of the program, now under the guidance of Competition & Participation Coordinator, Daniela Paszkiewicz, is about continuing to assist our clubs and venues to provide quality extension experiences to retain participants and encouraging more clubs and venues to become involved.

The Victorian Open was the largest event on the Australian Squash Tour in 2013 thanks to the continued support of two major sponsors – Kooyong Lawn Tennis Club and the Victorian Government. The Open was a \$10k event on both men's and women's professional circuits, providing a strong field in both quality and quantity and Squash Vic was delighted to have Australia's no 2, current world no 16 and former world champion, Rachael Grinham play (and win) the women's event.

Rachael, Zac Alexander, Song Sun-Mi (Korea) and Sarah Fitz-Gerald were also part of a promotional event at The Edge, Eureka Tower which although attracted minimal exposure in Australia was featured on a number of international squash websites and media releases. The Victorian Open graded events for players of all abilities were again well patronised although female participants continue to be poorly represented. This year both Open finals and semi-finals were web streamed live to a world-wide audience. In the 3 weeks following the event, 2,776 hits were registered through the website from 38 countries.

Squash Vic again received funding from Squash Australia in 2013 to support our elite player program – Squash Vic Academy, Targeted Athlete Program and Talent Development Squad - activities. Group and individual coaching opportunities were provided for along with sports science components and travel assistance.

Victorian players achieving success in 2013:

Melody Francis, Rex Hedrick and Sarah Cardwell – continued in the AIS squash program. All three, along with Taylor Flavell were part of the Commonwealth Games Doubles Camp in Darwin with Scotland

Nicole Stoneham –selected to represent Australia at the World Junior Women's event in Poland

Sam Ejtemai – won the Australian boys Under 17 title at the Australian Junior Championships

Vicki Cardwell – Manager of the Australian World Junior Women's Team

Squash Vic again partnered with Multiple Sclerosis Australia to host the third 24 Hour Mega Squash & (for

the first time) Racquetball event at the Melbourne Sports & Aquatic Centre in April 2013. 12 teams comprising over 170 players took part, exceeding the previous year's total by \$5,000 to raise \$23,500 to support those living with multiple sclerosis via MS Australia's Go for Gold scholarships and Financial Assistance Programs. Thank you to the sponsors and participants who supported the event and we look forward to doing it all again in 2014. If you haven't seen the event video clip, it is well worth a look at

Advocating and lobbying for squash as a priority sport with local and state government was a key activity in 2013 with the Executive Director presenting at several forums during the year. Squash Vic was one of 6 Associations to secure funding from the State Government for a Regional Facility Study and we look forward to publishing the findings in 2014. The study conducted with InsideEDGE Sports & Leisure Planning will provide a framework for the provision and development of squash and racquetball infrastructure and for stakeholder and partner participation in the planning and development of facilities for the next 10 years. Squash has a proud history as one of the most successful sports in Australia's heritage. Despite the sport's boom period and commercial development during the 60s, 70s and 80s, squash has lost over 70% of its facilities due to increasing land values and changing community lifestyles. Although the effect of the loss of facilities in regional Victoria is not as pronounced as it is in metropolitan Melbourne, a strategy is required to prioritise efforts to support the sustainability of regional clubs and venues into the future.

Squash Vic wishes to acknowledge the support received from member clubs, venues, associations, athletes and volunteers during the year, as well as the valuable assistance and contributions from the Department of Transport, Planning & Local Infrastructure (Sport & Recreation Victoria), VicHealth, Squash Australia, Dunlop, Deakin University, Oxford Education and our many partners and supporters.

Thank you to my staff over the year Richard, Daniela and Tegan for your support and dedication and to State Grade Pennant Administrator, Bryan Bird, for his ongoing contributions. Finally, thank you also to the Board of Squash Vic for your encouragement, patience and resolve.

WA Squash Report



2013 was a difficult year for WA Squash as we failed to secure a Healthway sponsorship for our development programs. With such programs well entrenched it was decided to absorb some of the profits of recent years and continue with the core components of our programs. In this way we will remain in the best situation to regain development sponsorship into the future.

Country Development

Mike Cornish continued his travels throughout the State to ensure that students in all regions of Western Australia gained some experience of what Squash is about. Mini Squash, Just Squash It and Inflatable Court sessions were presented to well in excess of 10,000 children in areas from Broome to Esperance and most places between. Visits created the opportunity for other Club Development opportunities such as Coaching sessions, Refereeing sessions, Talent Squad sessions, committee member assistance and advice as to how to access funding opportunities etc.

Juniors

Whilst the State Junior Team was disappointed to finish 5th overall at the Australian Junior Championships, we are pleased with the emergence of new State Team players from an increased number of Clubs throughout the State. It is encouraging to see players from areas as far away as the Kimberley and Pilbara now being more actively involved in our programs.

City of Perth International Squash Challenge

The 2013 event was again very well received by the 90 players (57 in PSA & 33 in WSA) who competed in the main events. Mike Corren taking out the PSA title for the fourth year in a row (five titles overall) and Meagan Craig from New Zealand winning the WSA event.

Referees

As has been the case in the last few years, a major Referee training and assessment program was conducted in conjunction with the 2013 City of Perth International Squash Challenge.

The sessions which were conducted by Chris Sinclair and John Small have provided the major impetus for increasing referee numbers and of progressing those already in the system.

Pennant

The number of Pennant players has again declined slightly. On a positive we have managed to maintain three nights of competition with ladies Divisions on each night. Some of our Clubs have shown sound growth of numbers to show what can be achieved with a positive approach and a logical progression plan.

Volunteers

WA Squash greatly appreciates the contribution of the volunteers who offer their time and energy to assist with the various aspects of activity that are necessary to drive the sport of Squash in this State. In an era when there is increasing pressure of free time available and consequently less people offering assistance, there is an increased workload on our existing volunteers. It is to their great credit that they continue to contribute so much.

Funding

WA Squash very much appreciates the financial assistance and support provided by the Department of Sport and Recreation. Unfortunately we were unable to secure Healthway sponsorship in 2013 but have been successful in obtaining funding for 2014 promoting the Smarter than Smoking message.

Board

After fourteen years on the Board (the last nine as President) Stephen Bowen stood down to focus on his role as a Board Member of Squash Australia. Shaun Billowes assumed the role as President until he transferred from Perth. Matthew Hansen is the newly elected President.

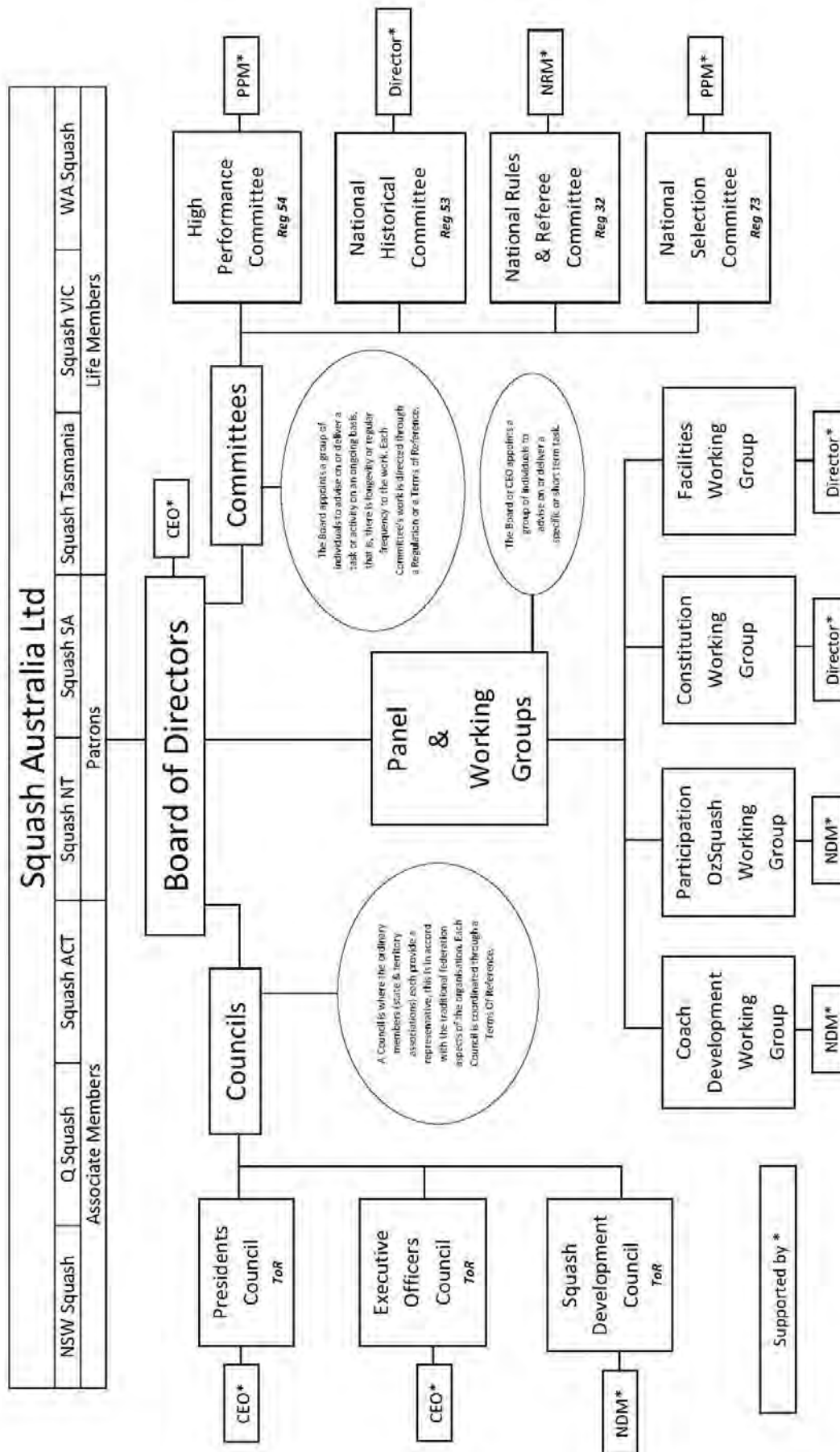
