Deeper study into the "historical books" of the Bible, e.g. Joshua, Judges, Samuel, Kings.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to demonstrate:

- Da'at (Theoria): basic knowledge of the Early Prophets
- Binah (Praxis): ability to exegete the Early Prophets with respect to their own (Jewish) contextual environment and its Hebraic expressions.
- Chochma (Poiesis): practical exegesis of the Early Prophets and application to the student's halakha.

• This course will be conducted in an online format combining textbook readings and chapter response assignments.

Assessment

- Essay assignments and research projects will be evaluated on a standard grading rubric. Written
 examinations will be graded according to content (multiple choice, fill-in-the blank, short
 answer, and/or essay).
- This course will be conducted in an **online** format combining textbook readings and assignments with video presentations and skype support. Vocabulary and Grammar evaluations will be conducted regularly, and vocalization audits will be conducted by skype or phone.

Project Descriptions

Midterm Examination

You will be tested on all reading and lecture content. Pay particular attention to things which are emphasized in both sources (repetition is a Hebraic method of conveying importance/emphasis).

Essays

3-5 pages (1" margins, 12-point Times New Roman, double spaced) on (1) a Judge and (2) a King of either Kingdom using at least 3 sources beyond the Bible. Turabian format (footnotes and appendices are encouraged).

Capstone Project:

12 to 15 page paper analyzing any passage covered in this course. Follow Stuart's model to formulate your paper. Your Works Consulted (as opposed to Works Cited) section should reflect 3-5 sources for each page of written text (1" margins, 12-point Times New Roman, double spaced). Turabian format (footnotes and appendices encouraged).
